PROCLAMATION

HEREAS, the unfolding of historical events dating back to the 1970s has closely associated the day of April 20 or "4/20" with the culture of marijuana use, especially here in the United States; and

WHEREAS, the Compassionate Use Act of 1996 and Proposition 64 were initiative statues that paved the way for legalization of medical and recreational marijuana in the state of California; and

WHEREAS, legalization effectively would perpetuate the culture that promotes marijuana use, thereby resulting in increased social acceptance and accompanying decreased perception of harm; and

WILEREAS, a critical issue that lies at the core of this phenomenon is increased youth access to marijuana at alarming rates; further, most recent findings of community assessments conducted by the Substance Abuse Prevent and Control (SAPD) of the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health within its Service Planning Area (SPA) which includes the City of Gardena, show that 59% of those surveyed perceived it to be very easy/somewhat easy to get marijuana on the street and 23% perceived marijuana use in their neighborhood to be a major problem; and

WHEREAS, the same assessment study establishes the mean age of initiating marijuana use among users within SPA 8 to be 16.7 years, which is younger than the legal age of 21 years for possession and use.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, TASHA CERDA, MAYOR OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, do hereby proclaim APRIL 20, 2019 ("4/20"), to be

CHALLENGE THE NORM AND INFLUENCE OF MARIJUANA USE ON YOUTH DAY

to call on a united Gardena to undertake concerted actions to inform and educate youth and adults about the harmful effects of marijuana use on individual and public health, especially on the development of the brain, as well as regarding social costs in terms of injuries, loss of lives, and destruction of public and private property that occur as a result of impaired driving.

He continued with the information that technology is constantly changing; that we do have charging facilities at GTRANS for the six electric buses we have now; and that there is a state of charge gauge on the buses that lets drivers and maintenance personnel know how much battery life is left on each of those buses. City Manager Medrano stated that GTRANS gets their funding from all different types of sources and commended Director Crespo and his staff for putting everything together.

D. COUNCIL REMARKS

- (1) COUNCIL MEMBER HENDERSON reported that, since the last Council Meeting, he was able to attend a District 2 Neighborhood Watch meeting and he hosted an Independent Cities Association monthly board meeting here at Gardena City Hall. He said members of the Board were very impressed with our grounds and our office space. He said he had a chance to attend the GTRANS Roadeo. He said was proud of our operators on the GTrans fleet; they were phenomenal. He thanked Director Ernie Crespo for keeping the morale up for the employees who enjoyed seeing him, the Mayor, and fellow Councilmembers at the event. He said he had a chance to meet for lunch with representatives of Centinela Youth Services. He said he works with their volunteers and have appreciation lunches with them one on one, to give them the opportunity to ask questions and share their experiences. He said he had his community meetings. He continued, reporting that, as a local control fanatic, he attended a small cells 5G webinar/conference call and said he asked many questions regarding impact of small cellular towers in 5G in the community. He ended his remarks by sharing that he attended the State of the City and said it was excellent. He said the feedback from residents was wonderful.

He reported that the car batteries are improving, and they are adjusting with various cities to have local recharge stations; that it would really improve the longevity with electric bus lines and car lines. He hinted that they are looking into all electric trucks from the port of Los Angeles. He shared that the State of the City was impressive, and it felt like a big party; that he was proud of City staff and thanked Stephany Santin. He ended his report by saying "Hi" to his granddaughter Angelina.
- (3) <u>COUNCIL MEMBER KASKANIAN</u> he reported that he attended a Gardena Valley Lions Club meeting and he spoke a little about the pantry and the State of the City. At the end of the meeting they decided to collect canned goods for the pantry at every meeting for the year 2019-2020. He said that he also attended the GTRANS Bus Roadeo. He congratulated Transportation Director Ernie Crespo for bringing home third place. He told Mayor Cerda, "job well done for the State of the City." On that same day, she attended the annual Koi show; that it was an interesting and great event where she saw unique koi fish and learned different ways to raise koi fish. She attended the koi banquet later that evening at which, besides the technical difficulties with the microphone which led the speakers having to yell, the event was great. She echoed the organization's appreciation to the City for what they did for them and the event. She commended Parks and Recreation staff for doing a great job. She mentioned that the person who originally brought the koi shows to the United States from Japan was present and recognized. She thanked everyone who had a hand in the preparation for the State of the City and with providing her with information to compile for the event. 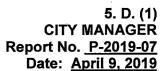

Description

Under direction of the City Manager, performs highly responsible and complex professional administrative work while assisting the City Manager in the development and control of the operational goals and objectives for all City departments in accordance with the City Council directives; provides leadership in policy formation and implementation of policies and procedures; promotes effective and efficient operations throughout the organization by facilitating interdepartmental cooperation and sharing of resources; provides responsible staff assistance to the City Manager and City Council; and serves as acting City Manager as required.

Representative Duties

- Ensure effectiveness of daily operations for all City activities; provide management direction by expediting work flow and assuring achievement of departmental work programs through direct supervision of the City's Executive Management Team.
- Lead the development of the budget according to City Council directives; coordinate special projects as designated by the City Manager.
- Maximize available resources by developing and installing improvements; coordinate service delivery levels with needs of citizens by addressing problems and complaints of the general public.
- Evaluate, update and finalize the City Manager's agenda for the City Council; evaluate reports from operating departments for consistency, accuracy, fiscal feasibility and political sensitivity; select appropriate recommendations for presentation to the City Council.
- Develop additional revenues and implement City objectives through the completion of special projects as requested by the City Manager.
- Develop recommendations on City-wide work methods, operating policies and procedures, programs services and other administrative issues; observe program operations; analyze findings and implications; make recommendations to the City Manager.
- Negotiate contracts and solutions on a variety of administrative, fiscal and special projects; participate in the preparation and monitoring of program or special project budgets.
- Schedule, coordinate and assign personnel to projects; review staff work and provide training as appropriate.
- Research and coordinate operating department responses to City Council requests; disseminate information and assist departments with City Council directives; update the City Council on the status of projects.
- Respond to and resolve difficult, complex and sensitive citizen inquiries and complaints; interpret, analyze, defend and explain City policies, procedures, programs and activities; negotiate and resolve sensitive and controversial issues.
- Coordinate and participate in providing responsible staff assistance to the City Manager, City Council and other City commissions as assigned; attend various meetings to assist or represent the City Manager's Office.
- Attend and participate in professional group meetings; maintain awareness of new trends and developments in the field of public administration; incorporate new developments as appropriate.
- Perform related duties as required.

Presented for City Council to receive and file is the City of Gardena Single Audit Report for the Fiscal Year ended June 30, 2018, as prepared by the City's contracted auditing firm, The Pun Group, LLP, Certified Public Accountants. The City is required to have a Single Audit performed annually on its major federal funds pursuant to the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-133.

The major program determination for the federal grants for Fiscal Year 2017-2018 resulted in three (3) major programs being tested:

- 1. Transit FTA Cluster
- 2. Gardena Family Childcare
- 3. Community Development Block Grant

The audit was conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards in the United States and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

The Single Audit is conducted to review the internal controls and adequacy of procedures carried out in the City's financial reporting. The auditors found no instances of non-compliance material to the basic financial statements of the City. The auditors identified one instance of procedural deficiency, but found no material weaknesses in any of the federal grant programs

In compliance with the deadline, the Single Audit package was submitted to the State Controller's Office on March 27, 2019.

Note 1 – Reporting Entity

Funds received under the various grant programs have been recorded within the special revenue funds and enterprise fund of the City. The City utilizes the modified accrual basis of accounting for the special revenue funds and the accrual basis of accounting for the enterprise funds. The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (the "Schedule") is presented in accordance with the requirements of Title 2 U.S. *Code of Federal Regulations ("CFR")* Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* (the "Uniform Guidance"). Therefore, some amounts presented in the Schedule may differ from amounts presented in, or used in, the preparation of City's basic financial statements.

Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards

The accompanying Schedule presents the activity of all federal financial assistance programs of the City. Federal financial assistance received directly from federal agencies, as well as federal financial assistance passed through the State of California Department of Housing and Community Development, the State of California Department of Transportation, the State of California Office of Traffic Safety, the State of California Department of Education, and the County of Los Angeles, are included in the Schedule. The Schedule was prepared from only the accounts of various grant programs and, therefore, does not present the financial position or results of operations of the City.

Indirect Cost Rate

The City did not elect to use the 10% de minimis cost rate.

Pursuant to the AICPA Audit Guide, Government Auditing Standards and Single Audits ("GAS-SA Guide"), Chapter 13 – Auditor Reporting Requirements and Other Communication Considerations in a Single Audit, paragraph 13.53, the auditor must follow up on prior audit findings, perform procedures to assess the reasonableness of the summary schedule of prior audit findings prepared by the auditee in accordance with Uniform Guidance, and report as a current year audit finding, when the auditor concludes that the summary schedule of prior audit findings materially misrepresents the status of any prior audit finding. The auditor must perform audit follow-up regardless of whether a prior audit finding relates to a major program in the current year.

Pursuant to the AICPA Audit Guide, GAS-SA Guide, Chapter 10 – Compliance Auditing Applicable to Major Programs, paragraph 10.71, to follow up on previous audit findings, the auditor should obtain the auditee's summary schedule of prior audit findings and perform appropriate procedures to determine the status of the audit findings included in the summary schedule that were reported in accordance with 2 CFR 200.516. Although, in many cases, the procedures performed in the current audit will provide a basis for the auditor to assess the schedule, the auditor may find it necessary to perform procedures directly specifically at the status of prior audit findings. In these cases, consideration might include the following procedures:

- Make inquiries of auditee management and program personnel, including inquiries about the status of corrective actions and the estimated completion date for incomplete actions.
- Review management decisions issued by federal awarding agencies or pass-through entities to the auditee
- Observe an activity that has been redesigned to address a prior year finding
- Test similar current year transactions

Condition:

To follow up with prior audit finding, we tested similar current year transactions. Pursuant to the adopted policy dated March 7, 2018 to address our prior year finding 2017-002, all volunteer applications should be signed by a Senior Bureau staff member upon receipt and review. Applications should continue to be reviewed thoroughly, and an orientation/intake meeting with the volunteer shall follow before they are assigned a role. However, during our testing of volunteer applications, we noted that 7 out of 40 volunteer applications selected for testing were missing indication of reviewing by City staff.

Statistically sampling was performed to draw sample selections. See condition above for context of the findings.

The finding is a repeat finding from prior year finding 2017-002.

Recommendation:

We recommend the City follow the formal policy created on March 7, 2018 for the reviewing process over volunteer applications to ensure the volunteers are qualified for the responsibilities that they are taking on.

City management concurs with this recommendation.

The Bureau of Gambling Control (Bureau) has reviewed Larry Flynt's Lucky Lady Casino's request to offer the modified gaming activity of Blazing Sevens Progressive Jackpot for play. This letter is to inform you that the Bureau has approved this request, and Larry Flynt's Lucky Lady Casino may begin offering the modified gaming activity for play, as enclosed, pending any approvals that may be required by the local jurisdiction. This letter of approval and the enclosed rules shall be kept on file, at Larry Flynt's Lucky Lady Casino, and be readily available for review during all hours of operation. Any changes to the approved rules of play shall constitute a new gaming activity and invalidate this approval. In addition, this approval letter shall supersede the previous approval letter dated February 21, 2018.

The Bureau reserves the right to: (1) review the lawfulness of the modified gaming activity of Blazing Sevens Progressive Jackpot; (2) notify all law enforcement agencies and gambling establishments if further review determines the modified gaming activity of Blazing Sevens Progressive Jackpot to be unlawful; (3) require gambling establishments to cease and desist offering the modified gaming activity of Blazing Sevens Progressive Jackpot if found to be unlawful; and (4) take action against those gambling establishments that decline to abide by the Bureau's cease and desist notification.

Larry Flynt's Lucky Lady Casino shall offer the modified Blazing Sevens Progressive Jackpot gaming activity in accordance with the Bureau approved rules, as enclosed.

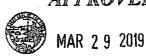

Furthermore, all rules and procedures for the gaming activity, including but not limited to the following, shall be prominently displayed in Larry Flynt's Lucky Lady Casino at all times the gaming activity is being offered for play:

- Eligible games and time periods
- Qualifying Hands
- Prize payout structure
- The prize amount to be awarded
- Availability of No Purchase Necessary
- Any other restrictions that apply to this gaming activity

Eligible Controlled Games

The Blazing Sevens Progressive Jackpot shall be attached to the following Bureau approved controlled games offered at Larry Flynt's Lucky Lady Casino, as shown below, at all times this gaming activity is being offered for play. Blazing Sevens Progressive Jackpot

Object and Summary

Bureau of Gambling

A player that makes one of the qualifying hands listed below for the Blazing Sevens Progressive Jackpot is eligible to win either a fixed prize or the progressive prize amount.

- 1. To begin each round, players must place a base game wager in order to qualify for the jackpot. Along with any bonus bets the player places a wager on, player(s) have the option to place an optional \$1 jackpot fee and become eligible for the jackpot.
- 2. "Hockey Puck" discs will be attached to the table in front of each betting position. These discs have a sensor and will detect when a casino chip is placed on them. Players who wish to participate must place the jackpot fee on the sensor. The sensor will then light up.
- 3. Once all players place their controlled game wagers and jackpot fees, the house dealer will press "Start Game" on the keypad. The sensors will then light up, indicating participation in the progressive gaming activity.
- 4. The house dealer will then remove all jackpot fees from the table. The jackpot fees shall be dropped into a separate and locked jackpot collection box and accounted for separately.
- 5. The house dealer then follows standard approved procedures for dealing the controlled game. Any player who makes a qualifying hand will be paid out, as described below.

Qualifying Hands

Players, who make one of the advertised qualifying hands, shall be eligible to win their share of the posted prize amount, according to the payout options, as shown below. All hands within the chart must be offered together at all times this promotion is offered for play.

Eligibility Requirements

This gaming activity shall be open to all players who are seated and playing at any of the above listed controlled games during the pre-determined specified hours designated and posted for the gaming activity. This gaming activity may run concurrently with other gaming activities.

- Only seated players are eligible for payouts.
 - o Backline bettors are not eligible to participate in this jackpot.
- A player can qualify for the jackpot element of the game regardless of the outcome of the controlled game.
- A minimum of two players, a player and the player-dealer, are required to be dealt into the base game in order for the table to qualify for this promotion.
- There is no minimum amount of time that must be played in order for an eligible table to qualify for the jackpot.
- There is no limit to the number of times a patron may win a prize during any promotional period.
- Casino employees are eligible to participate when off duty and out of uniform.
- Third-Party Providers of Proposition Player Services (TPPPS) are not eligible for this promotion.

The player-dealer position is not eligible for this promotion.

Prize

All monies collected and paid out shall be tracked both electronically and on a hand written log to be maintained by the casino for examination by regulatory and law enforcement personnel.

- Three seven's (7s) of the same color is paid 100% of the progressive jackpot amount shown on the progressive meter.
- All other hands are paid a fixed amount from the reserve fund. They do not get deducted from the amount shown on the meter.
- In the event more than one player achieves a winning progressive hand, all winning players will share, in equal amounts, the posted progressive prize.
 - o In the event there is an odd number of chips, the odd amount will be awarded to the patron seated closest to the first action position.
- In the event more than one player achieves the same winning fixed hand, all winning players will be paid the posted fixed prize.
 - o In the event the reserve fund is depleted, the Casino will make up any shortfall. The Casino shall be reimbursed for any shortfall covered once there are sufficient monies in the reserve fund.
- Players who are playing multiple hands are eligible to place multiple jackpot fees and qualify for multiple prizes.
- All progressive and fixed payouts will be paid by a casino representative.
 - Once the proper paperwork has been filled out, a casino representative will immediately pay the winner(s) in live casino chips from the cage. No payouts will be made from the house dealer's tray.

Funding

The Blazing Sevens Progressive Jackpot is a player funded progressive jackpot which features fixed and progressive prize elements. The Casino will initially seed the jackpot at a minimum of \$1,000 to a maximum of \$50,000. Once there are sufficient monies in the Blazing Sevens Progressive Jackpot fund, the initial seed will be reimbursed to the Casino from the reserve fund and shall be documented in the accounting records. There is no cap to this progressive jackpot.

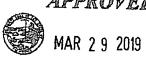
After the progressive jackpot is hit, it will be re-seeded by the reserve fund at an amount between a minimum of \$1,000 and a maximum of \$50,000. In addition, this reserve fund will payout all fixed amounts. In the event the reserve fund is depleted, the Casino will make up any shortfall. Once there are sufficient monies in the Blazing Sevens Progressive Jackpot reserve fund, the re-seed amount, up to the amount the Casino funded, will be reimbursed to the Casino from the reserve fund and shall be documented in the accounting records. All increases and decreases to the Blazing Sevens Progressive Jackpot fund shall be documented in the accounting records.

Each \$1 jackpot fee paid by a player will be broken down as follows:

- \$0.20 will be immediately posted on the meter.
- \$0.80 will be tracked in a reserve fund.

Administrative Fees

Bureau of Gambling

The casino will take an administrative fee ranging from \$10 - \$16 per table per hour. The administrative fee will be taken from the reserve fund. The fee will cover the costs associated with the complicated computer system and program in addition to technicians having to service the systems.

No Purchase Necessary

The Blazing Sevens Progressive Jackpot shall be offered to customers who wish to participate for free, on a general and indiscriminate basis, with <u>no restrictions</u>. The Casino shall provide No Purchase Necessary tables for all patrons who request to participate in the gaming activity without paying a table fee or placing a live wager. <u>All advertisement material shall state "No Purchase Necessary" when referencing the Blazing Sevens Progressive Jackpot. This requirement extends to all forms of advertising including electronic message boards, computer monitors, posters, and flyers.</u>

Equipment

The electronic software and digital reader related to and used in conjunction with this gaming activity has been tested, approved, and certified by the Gaming Laboratories International, LLC (GLI).

- 1. When a player has a progressive winning hand, the dealer shall press the appropriate hand button on the keypad.
- 2. The house dealer shall then contact a supervisor.
- 3. Once the Casino verifies the progressive win, the supervisor will press the confirm button.
 - a. To complete the action, a Supervisor or Executive card (depending on jackpot level) swipe is required.
 - b. This records the win onto the Game Manager computer and adjusts the meter appropriately for the prize won.
 - c. House procedures are then followed for paying the prize. (Reviewing the monitor connected to the Game Manager will show the prize amount to be paid, and pressing the "money bag" icon will print a win page, which can be used to help record the payout for accounting.)
- 4. When the dealer reconciles all action, he presses "END GAME". This resets the system to begin the next hand.

Staff respectfully recommends that the City Council adopt Ordinance No. 1803.

At the March 12, 2019, City Council Meeting, a Public Hearing was conducted regarding "Stonefield 63," a proposed 63-unit condominium townhome development located at 14031 South Vermont Avenue, 1101 West 141st Street, and 1017 West 141st Street, by Applicant KB Home Greater Los Angeles Inc.

Two resolutions relating to this project were considered and adopted by Council on March 12, 2019:

- Resolution No. 6366, Approving a Mitigated Negative Declaration and a Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting program for a General Plan Amendment and Zone Change of 3.9 gross acres located at 14031 South Vermont Avenue and 1017 West 141st Street; and
- Resolution No. 6363, Approving General Plan Amendment #1-18 changing the land use designation of Property located at 14031 South Vermont Avenue, and 1017 West 141st Street from General Commercial to Medium-Density Residential.

Also, on March 12, 2019, Ordinance No. 1803 was introduced by Council Member Henderson. This Ordinance, when adopted, approves a Zone Change from General Commercial (C-3) to Medium Density Multiple-Family Residential (R-3) for the properties located at 14031 South Vermont Avenue, 1101 West 141st Street, and 1017 West 141st Street.

A Public Notice regarding Ordinance No. 1803 was officially published in the Gardena Valley News on March 28, 2019. Therefore, it is recommended that the City Council now adopt Ordinance No. 1803.

ORDINANCE NO. 1803

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, APPROVING ZONE CHANGE #2-18 CHANGING THE ZONING OF A 3.9 GROSS ACRE SITE AT 14031 SOUTH VERMONT AVENUE, 1101 WEST 141ST STREET, AND 1017 WEST 141ST STREET TO MEDIUM-DENSITY MULTIPLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL (R-3)

(ZC #2-18; APNS: 6115-017-036 and 6115-018-004)

WHEREAS, on July 5, 2018, the applicant, KB Home Greater Los Angeles Inc., filed an application to develop a 63-unit residential project consisting of attached townhomes in 14 buildings on the two parcels located at 14031 South Vermont Avenue, 1101 West 141st Street, and 1017 West 141st Street, comprising 3.9 gross acres (the "Property"); and

WHEREAS, in order to develop the residential project, the following entitlements (collectively, the "Project") are required: General Plan Amendment changing the land use designation from General Commercial to Medium Density Residential (GPA #1-18); Zone Change to change the zoning from General Commercial (C-3) to Medium-Density Residential (R-3) (ZC #2-18); Vesting Tract Map to create 63 townhome lots (VTTM 82263); Site Plan Review for the proposed Project (SPR #8-18); and a variance to approve the proposed wall for perimeter fencing along South Vermont Avenue which is eight (8) feet on the South Vermont side and six (6) feet on the Project side along South Vermont Avenue (VAR #1-18); and

WHEREAS, the applicant originally applied for a General Plan Amendment and Zone Change for High Density Residential but, after recalculating the density, it was determined that the development met the Medium Density residential standards; and

WHEREAS, a Mitigated Negative Declaration ("MND") was prepared for the Project and there was a public review period on the MND from November 29, 2018 through December 28, 2018; and

WHEREAS, on February 19, 2019, the Planning Commission of the City of Gardena held a duly-noticed public hearing on the Project at which time it considered all evidence, both written and oral; and

WHEREAS, after the close of the public hearing, the Planning Commission adopted Resolution No. PC 4-19 which: approved the Mitigated Negative Declaration for the Vesting Tentative Tract Map, Site Plan Review, and Variance; approved the entitlements for the Vesting Tentative Tract Map, Site Plan Review, and Variance; recommended that the City Council approve the Mitigated Negative Declaration for the General Plan Amendment and Zone Change; and recommended that the City Council approve the General Plan Amendment; and approve the Zone Change; and

WHEREAS, after the Planning Commission meeting it was discovered that the property designated as 1101 West 141st Street had a land use designation of medium density residential and a zoning designation of Low-Density Multiple-Family Residential (R-2); and

WHEREAS, the property at 1101 West 141st Street was always shown as part of the project and included in the zone change map provided to the Planning Commission; and

WHEREAS, on March 12, 2019, the City Council held a public hearing on the Project at which time it considered all evidence, both written and oral; and

WHEREAS, after the close of the public hearing and prior to adopting this Ordinance the City Council adopted Resolution No. 6366 approving the Mitigated Negative Declaration and Resolution No. 6363 approving the General Plan amendment change from General Commercial to Medium Density Residential;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Section 18.52.010 of the Gardena Municipal Code provides that the land use and zoning of property may be amended "[w]henever the public necessity, convenience, general welfare, or good land use and zoning practices require. . ." The City Council hereby approves the zone change of the property at 14031 South Vermont Avenue and 1017 West 141st Street from General Commercial (C-3) to Medium Density Multiple Family Residential (R-3) and the zone change of the property designated as 1101 West 141st Street from Low-Density Multiple-Family Residential (R-2) to Medium Density Multiple Family Residential (R-3) as shown on Exhibit A, attached hereto. In taking this action, the City Council makes the following specific findings:

- A. The change is in the best interests of the general welfare and represents good land use planning practices.
- B. The zone change is consistent with General Plan Amendment #1-18 that was approved by Resolution No. 6363 changing the land use designation to Medium Density Residential and will make the zoning consistent with the General Plan.
- C. The Project site is in the City's northeast quadrant, in a predominantly commercial and residential area. The current land use designation is General Commercial. Single-family and multiple-family residential uses lie directly to the west of the site, although that area has a General Plan land use designation of medium density and a zoning designation of Low-Density Multiple-Family Residential (R-2) and Medium Density Multiple-Family Residential (R-3). The zone change, and corresponding General Plan amendment, represent a logical extension of the residential uses to the west and residential uses is more compatible with such uses than commercial uses.
- D. The Property is currently underutilized. The Property was originally operated as excess parking for the Lucky Lady Casino and its predecessor but is no longer used for this purpose. Instead, it is used for onsite wood shop/storage, office/storage, and shipping containers for the Casino. Additionally, the parking lot is also used by a vehicle repossession/auction company as an onsite parking lot. The Project represents a better use of the Property than the current uses.

SECTION 2. This Ordinance shall take effect on the thirty-first (31") day after passage.

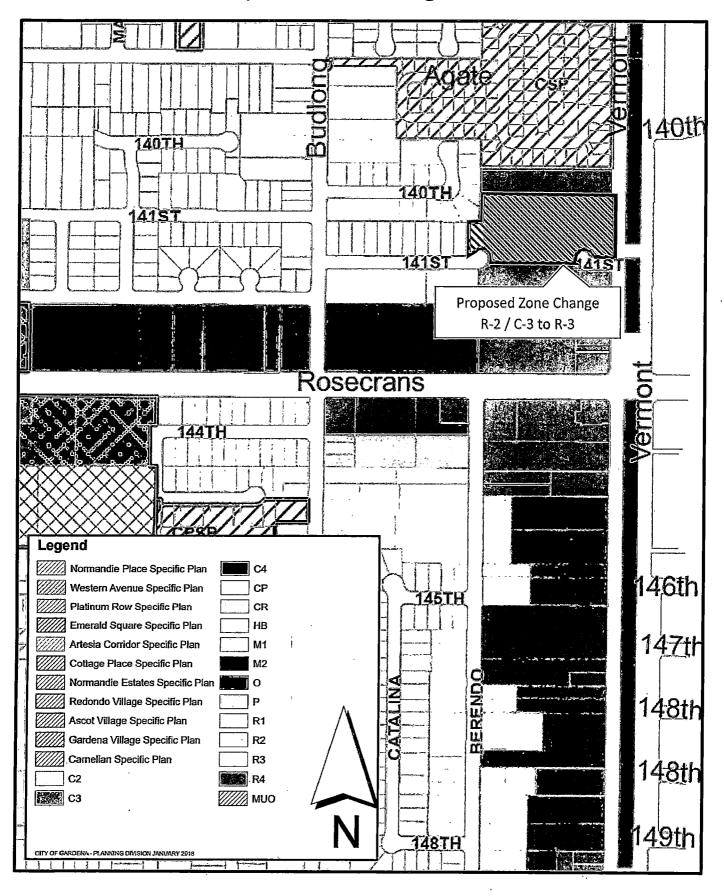

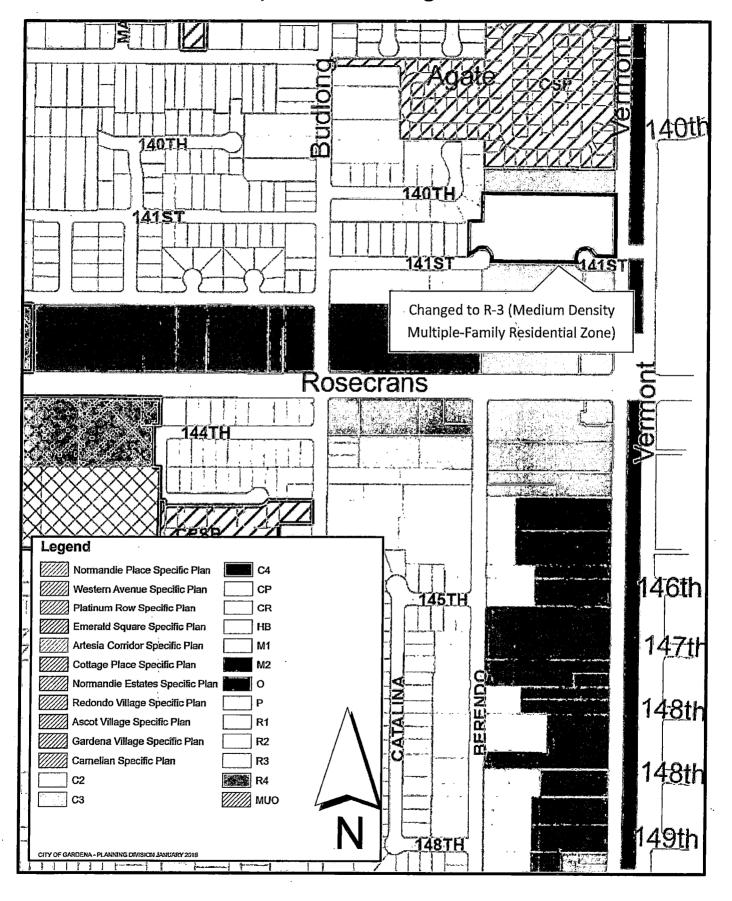

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

G3 Urban, Inc., Developer, filed an entitlement application for development of a 64-unit townhome and live-work project on properties consisting of 2.95 acres (2315, 2403, 2415, 2421, and 2545 Marine Avenue). In order to develop the Project in the Mixed-Use Overlay zone, the Developer requires a tract map and site plan approvals.

During the Due Diligence phase, it became known to the developer that soil contamination existed on portions of the site. Typically, development projects would not move forward due to cost and liability concerns; however, the developer and City staff agreed to terms that would provide for a path to soil remediation. The City believes it is in the public interest for Developer to pay for such services because portions of the project site have been public nuisances for decades and soil contamination would cause further blight and potential delays in soil remediation.

In order to facilitate the elimination of blighted conditions on the Site, and to provide assistance for the development of housing thereon, the Agreement calls for the City to pay up to \$150,000.00 of Developer's predevelopment costs for environmental studies. Those costs would normally be the Developer's responsibility under a Reimbursement Agreement between the City and Developer. The Agreement also provides that the City will contribute up to an additional \$650,000.00 to assist in the clean-up of hazardous materials on the Site.

Lastly, Developer understands that there is no guarantee that the City will approve, or conditionally approve, its Project.

DISCUSSION

Under the Agreement, in lieu of a Developer deposit under the Reimbursement Agreement, the City will pay for the first \$124,954.00 called for in that agreement. If additional amounts are required, City, in lieu of Developer, shall pay up to \$25,046.00 dollars in addition to the initial payment. Any required deposits in excess of \$150,000.00 shall be the sole responsibility of

Developer. Developer shall execute an unsecured note in favor of the City which will be payable only if Developer abandons the project.

If City pays less than the \$150,000.00, the difference between the amount paid by City and \$150,000.00 shall be added to the amount eligible for reimbursing the cost of environmental clean-up Services in accordance with the Agreement.

The Developer shall execute an unsecured note to provide for repayment of the amounts advanced by City for the Reimbursement Agreement in the event that Developer abandons the "Abandoning" the project is defined as a failure to pursue entitlements for the Project for a period of one year, a failure to commence remediation of contaminated portions of the Site within 6 months from receiving entitlements, or a failure to commence construction within 6 months from closure of the remedial action by the appropriate regulatory agency.

The City shall also reimburse Developer for the actual reasonable cost of the remediation Services performed by Consultant in an amount not to exceed \$650,000.00. Reimbursement shall be made by City providing a credit to Developer in an amount equal to any City permit and inspection fees, Quimby fees, and development fees payable for the Project. Developer shall not receive a credit for any fees payable to other entities, such as the Los Angeles Unified School District, and fees paid for processing entitlements other than as provided in Section 1 of this Agreement.

In the event that Developer acquires the Site and commences the Services described in the subject Agreement prior to securing entitlements, Developer may request the City to reimburse the cost of the remediation services as they are performed rather than as a credit against permit, inspection and development fees. The City Manager can approve such request provided that Developer provides for repayment of all sums so reimbursed with a note payable to City secured by a first deed of trust against the Site. The note shall be repayable upon Developer securing construction financing, or, in any event, not more than one-year from the date of execution. Any amounts so repaid on the note shall revive, in an equal amount, Developer's entitlement to credits against permit, inspection and development fees.

Any costs for Services in excess of the amount of \$650,000 shall be the responsibility of Developer.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

The report required by Government Code Section 53083 for economic development subsidies is attached hereto. The report was posted on the City Web Site and a Notice of the Public Hearing on the subsidy was published in the Gardena Valley News on March 28,2019.

CITY OF GARDENA ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT SUBSIDY REPORT PURSUANT TO GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 53083

INTRODUCTION

Legislative Intent

With the adoption of Assembly Bill 562 in 2013, now codified as California Government Code Section 53083, the California Legislature recognized the authority of local officials to use their regulatory powers, direct spending, and tax policies to influence where, when, and how the private sector invests capital and improves real property. The Legislature also intended to promote transparency and accountability in economic development subsidies, similar to annual financial reporting and local fiscal decisions. The legislation requires that subsidies to local businesses in the amount of \$100,000 or more – those intended to increase employment, enhance the local tax base, and attract or retain desirable businesses – be detailed in a written report and placed on an agenda for a public hearing at a regularly scheduled meeting. The City Council, at its regularly scheduled April 9, 2019 meeting, will consider approval of an agreement that would provide a subsidy in excess of \$100,000 to G3 Urban, Inc. and Affiliates. Therefore, this report is intended to satisfy the requirements of Government Code Section 53083, and is being made available to the public prior to consideration of the proposed agreement and authorization of the economic development subsidy.

Proposed Agreement

The City of Gardena proposes to enter into an Economic Development Subsidy Agreement ("Agreement") in an effort to remediate contaminated properties, eliminate blight and assist the development of 63 single family dwelling units. The Agreement requires the City to pay up to \$150,000.00 of Developer's predevelopment costs for environmental studies. The Agreement also provides that the City will contribute up to an additional \$650,000.00 to assist in the clean-up of hazardous materials on the development site. These monies will be provided as credits against permit and impact fees otherwise payable by developer.

AB 562 REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

This section addresses the required reporting elements of Government Code Section 53083.

- (1) The name and address of all corporations or any other business entities, except for sole proprietorships, that are the beneficiary of the economic development subsidy, if applicable.
- G3 is a California incorporated entity and has its principal place of business at 15235 South Western Avenue, Gardena, CA 90249.
 - (2) The start and end dates and schedule, if applicable, for the economic development subsidy.

The first \$150,000 for predevelopment costs will be advanced by City during the project entitlement phase. Developer's costs for remediation of hazardous materials on the site will be applied as credits against fees that are payable to the City prior to commencing construction. Thus the subsidy will commence upon approval of the Agreement and will end prior to commencing construction.

(3) A description of the economic development subsidy, including the estimated total amount of the expenditure of public funds by, or of revenue lost to, the local agency because of the economic development subsidy.

The proposed Agreement, in essence, waives up to \$800,000.00 in permit and impact fees in an amount equal to the costs to perform environmental studies and to clean-up the contaminated properties. The City anticipates that the fees payable by Developer for the development will be approximately \$800,000. Absent the development the City would not receive these fees so the City is not truly out of pocket for the subsidy provided by this Agreement.

The City's normal practice is to have a developer enter into a Reimbursement Agreement to pay the City's costs for conducting environmental studies and other entitlement processing costs. Under the proposed Agreement the Developer will enter into a Reimbursement Agreement but the City will pay for the first \$124,954.00 called for in the agreement. If additional amounts are required, City, in lieu of Developer, shall pay up to \$25,046.00 dollars in addition to the initial payment. Any required deposits in excess of \$150,000.00 shall be the sole responsibility of Developer. Developer shall execute an unsecured note in favor of the City which will be payable if Developer abandons the project. If City pays less than the \$150,000.00, the difference between the amount paid by City and \$150,000.00 shall be added to the amount eligible for reimbursing the cost of environmental clean-up services.

The Developer shall execute an unsecured note to provide for repayment of the amounts advanced by City for the Reimbursement Agreement in the event that Developer abandons the Project.

The City shall also reimburse Developer for the actual reasonable cost of the remediation services performed in an amount not to exceed \$650,000.00. Reimbursement shall be made by City providing a credit to Developer in an amount equal to any City permit and inspection fees, Quimby fees, and development fees payable for the Project. Developer shall not receive a credit for any fees payable to other entities, such as the Los Angeles Unified School District, and fees paid for processing entitlements other than as provided in Section 1 of this Agreement. Any costs for Services in excess of the amount of \$650,000 shall be the responsibility of Developer

In the event that Developer acquires the Site and commences the Services described in the subject Agreement prior to securing entitlements, Developer may request the City to reimburse the cost of the remediation services as they are performed rather than as a credit against permit, inspection and development fees. The City Manager can approve such request provided that Developer provides for repayment of all sums so reimbursed with a note payable to City secured by a first deed of trust against the development site. The note shall be repayable upon Developer securing construction financing, or, in any event, not more than one-year from the date of execution. Any

amounts so repaid on the note shall revive, in an equal amount, Developer's entitlement to credits against permit, inspection and development fees.

(4) A statement of the public purposes for the economic development subsidy.

The major portion of the development site has been unproductive blighted property for decades. The presence of soil contamination impedes productive use of the site. Clean up of contaminated properties and converting blighted properties into residential use serves an important public purpose.

(5) Projected tax revenue to the local agency as a result of the economic development subsidy.

The 63 homes should produce annual property tax revenues to the City in an approximate amount of \$45,000. Current property tax revenues are nominal. The residents of the homes should also increase utility tax and sales tax receipts in the City in an amount that is roughly estimated at \$20,000 annually.

(6) Estimated number of jobs created by the economic development subsidy, broken down by full-time, part-time, and temporary positions.

G3 Urban estimates that it will create a total of 150 or more jobs by the economic development subsidy. Of those jobs, 25 will be full time, and 125 will be temporary positions.

AGREEMENT TO ASSIST REMEDIATION OF CONTAMINATED PROPERTY AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF HOUSING

THIS Agreement to Assist Remediation of Contaminated Property and to Provide for the Development of Housing ("Agreement") is made and entered into this ___ day of April, 2019, by and between the CITY OF GARDENA ("City") and G3 URBAN, a California corporation ("Developer").

RECITALS

- A. Developer is a residential home builder. Developer has submitted applications to develop a 64-unit residential, condominium project with live-work units on the parcels identified below (the "Project");
- B. Developer is negotiating to acquire the following properties (the "Site") to assemble land for the Project:

Parcel A: Address: 2545 Marine Ave.; APN: 4064-023-018; Ownership: Mark Musik Choi and Kyung Jean Choi (in escrow);

Parcel B: Address: 2421 Marine Ave; APN 4064-023-019; Ownership: Gustavo and Gabino Orendain;

Parcel C: Address: 2403 Marine Ave. and 2415 Marine Ave.; APN: 4064-023-020 and 4064-023-021; Ownership: Millennium Investments LLC. (in escrow);

Parcel D: Address: 2315 Marine Ave.; APN: 4064-023-034 and 4064-023-022; Ownership: Marine Avenue Investments LLC (in escrow).

- C. The site consists of undeveloped land, active commercial uses, and a vacant multi-story building that previously was used as a hospital.
- D. A Phase II Environmental Assessment conducted by Developer indicates that Parcel C contains soil and vapor contamination and that the contamination may have migrated to one or more of the above surrounding properties. The Phase II recommends that additional studies be done, and remedial action be taken.
- E. The presence of hazardous materials on the Site constitutes a blighted condition that contributes to the current underutilization of the Site.
- F. If the entitlements for the development are approved, Developer will require financial assistance in completing any additional required studies and remedial work.

- G. It is in the public interest for contaminated properties to be remediated and the City will assist in cleaning up the contaminated parcel or parcels in order to make the parcels suitable for development and eliminate blighted and underutilized property.
- H. Developer will incur certain predevelopment expenses pursuant to a Reimbursement Agreement between the City of Gardena and Developer for the Payment Of Fees and Costs For Contract Environmental, Planning, Engineering and Legal Services Relating to the Development of a 64 Unit Project Located On Marine Avenue attached as Exhibit A (the "Reimbursement Agreement").
- I. In order to facilitate the elimination of blighted conditions on the Site, and to provide assistance for the development of housing thereon, the City is prepared to pay up to \$150,000.00 to meet the Developer's obligations under the Reimbursement Agreement and to contribute up to an additional \$650,000.00 to assist in the clean-up of hazardous materials on the Site.
- J. Developer understands that there is no guarantee that the City will approve, or conditionally approve, its Project.

NOW, THEREFORE, City and Developer agree, as follows.

- 1. City, in lieu of a Developer deposit, shall pay for the first \$124,954.00 called for in the Reimbursement Agreement. If additional amounts are required, City, in lieu of Developer, shall pay up to \$25,046.00 dollars in addition to the initial payment. Any required deposits in excess of \$150,000.00 shall be the sole responsibility of Developer. If City pays less than the \$150,000.00, the difference between the amount paid by City and \$150,000.00 shall be added to the amount eligible for reimbursing the cost of Services in accordance with Section 4 of this Agreement.
- 2. Developer shall execute an unsecured note in the form attached hereto as Exhibit B to provide for repayment of the amounts advanced by City for the Reimbursement Agreement in the event that Developer abandons the project. As used herein, "abandoning" the project is defined as a failure to pursue entitlements for the Project for a period of one year, a failure to commence remediation of contaminated portions of the Site within 6 months from receiving entitlements, or a failure to commence construction within 6 months from closure of the remedial action by the appropriate regulatory agency.
- 3. If the entitlements are approved, the Developer will enter into a consultant agreement with Mearns Consulting Corp. ("Consultant"), or another consultant subject to the approval of the City, to perform additional assessments, testing, and work with the proper regulatory agency to determine what actions are required for, and carry out, the environmental cleanup of the affected property to a level necessary to allow residential development ("Services").
- 4. City shall reimburse Developer for the actual reasonable cost of the Services performed by Consultant in an amount not to exceed \$650,000.00 or \$650,000.00

adjusted in accordance with Section 1 of this Agreement. Reimbursement shall only be made by City providing a credit to Developer in an amount equal to any City permit and inspection fees, Quimby fees, and development fees payable for the Project. Developer shall not receive a credit for any fees payable to other entities, such as the Los Angeles Unified School District, and fees paid for processing entitlements other than as provided in Section 1 of this Agreement.

- 5. Any costs for Services in excess of the amount of \$650,000 shall be the responsibility of Developer.
- 6. In the event that Developer acquires the Site and commences the Services described in Section 3 of this Agreement prior to securing entitlements, Developer may request the City to reimburse the cost of the Services as they are performed rather than as a credit against permit, inspection and development fees. The City Manager can approve such request provided that Developer provides for repayment of all sums so reimbursed with a note payable to City secured by a first deed of trust against the Site. Said note shall be repayable upon Developer securing construction financing, or, in any event, not more than one-year from the date of execution. Any amounts so repaid on the note shall revive, in an equal amount, Developer's entitlement to credits against permit, inspection and development fees.
- 7. Developer shall share all information prepared by Consultant with the City.
- 8. Based on Mayfield Place Housing Project, Public Works Case No. 2016-033 City has made a determination that reimbursement of the cost of the Services does not trigger the prevailing wage requirements of Labor Code Section 1720 et seq. because Developer's project is a residential project. Developer shall indemnify City should this determination be ruled incorrect by the Department of Industrial Relations or a court of law.
- 9. <u>Indemnity</u>. Developer agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless City, and its elected and appointed councils, boards, commissions, officers, agents, employees, and representatives from any and all claims, costs (including legal fees and costs) and liability for any challenge to this Agreement or for any personal injury or property damage which may arise directly or indirectly as a result of any actions or inactions by the Developer, or any actions or inactions of Developer's contractors, subcontractors, agents, or employees in connection with the subject matter of this Agreement.
- 10. <u>Bodily Injury, Property Damage, Contractor's Pollution Liability and Workers' Compensation Insurance</u>. Prior to commencing clean-up work on the Site and throughout the period of the performance of the Services, Developer shall maintain at its sole expense, or insure its consultants and contractors maintain at their sole expense, insurance limits as stipulated in this section.
 - (a) Minimum Scope and Limit of Insurance.

Coverage shall be at least as broad as:

- 1. Commercial General Liability (CGL): Insurance Services Office Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal & advertising injury with limits no less than \$3,000,000 per occurrence and \$5,000,000 in the aggregate.
- 2. Automobile Liability: Insurance Services Office Form Number CA 0001 covering, Code 1 (any auto), or if Developer has no owned autos, Code 8 (hired) and 9 (non-owned), with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage, unless otherwise approved by City.
- 3. Workers' Compensation insurance as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease.
- 4. Builder's Risk (Course of Construction) insurance utilizing an "All Risk" (Special Perils) coverage form, with limits equal to the completed value of the project and no coinsurance penalty provisions. Developer may submit evidence of Builder's Risk insurance in the form of Course of Construction coverage.
- (b) Contractors' Pollution Legal Liability with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence or claim, and \$2,000,000 policy aggregate.
- (c) Other Insurance Provisions. The insurance policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:
 - 1. Additional Insured Status. The City its officers, officials, employees, (as defined in Section 1.2.3) are to be additional insureds on the CGL policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the Developer including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to the Developer's insurance (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10 and CG 20 37 forms if later revisions used).
 - 2. Primary Coverage. For any claims related to this contract, the Developer's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the City its officers, officials, employees. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the City, its officers, officials, employees, shall be excess of the Developer's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
 - 3. Contractors and Subcontractors. With the exception of Contractors' Pollution Legal Liability, Developer shall require and verify that all contractors and subcontractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated herein, and Developer shall ensure that City is an additional insured on insurance required

from contractors/subcontractors. For CGL coverage contractors and subcontractors shall provide coverage with a format least as broad as CG 20 38 04 13.

- 4. Notice of Cancellation. Each insurance policy required above shall state that coverage shall not be canceled, except with notice to the City.
- 5. Waiver of Subrogation. Developer hereby grants to City a waiver of any right to subrogation which any insurer of said Developer may acquire against the City by virtue of the payment of any loss under such insurance. Developer agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation provided such endorsement is available on commercially reasonable terms, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the City has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.
- 6. Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions. Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the City. The City may require the Developer to provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention.
- 7. Acceptability of Insurers. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A:VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the City.
- 8. Deductibles. All such insurance shall have deductibility limits of not greater than \$50,000.00 unless otherwise approved by City.
- 9. Verification of Coverage. Developer shall furnish the City with original certificates and amendatory endorsements or copies of the applicable policy language providing the insurance coverage required above. All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the City before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Developer's obligation to provide them. The City reserves the right to require complete copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements, required by these specifications, at any time.
- 10. Occurrence Basis Coverage. All policies shall be written on an occurrence basis unless otherwise approved by City.
- 11. <u>Termination</u>. This Agreement shall automatically terminate, without notice, if Developer abandons the Project or fails to obtain entitlements for the Project. City may also, by written notice to Developer, terminate this Agreement if Developer fails to commence clean-up of the Site within two years from the date of this Agreement or if Developer, having commenced clean-up, fails to diligently pursue the clean-up to completion and closure. Upon termination, Developer shall have no further rights under this Agreement.

- 12. Enforced Delay Extension of Time of Performance. Notwithstanding specific provisions of this Agreement, performance by either party hereunder shall not be deemed to be in default where delays or defaults are due to war; insurrection; strikes; lock-outs; labor disputes; riots; floods; earthquakes; fires; casualties; acts of God; action of the elements; acts of the public enemy; epidemics; quarantine restrictions; freight embargoes; lark of transportation; governmental restrictions or priority; litigation including litigation challenging the validity of this transaction or any element thereof; unusually severe weather; acts of the other party; or any other causes beyond the control or without the fault of the party claiming an extension of time to perform. An extension of time for any such cause shall be for the period of the enforced delay and shall commence to run from the time of the commencement of the cause, if notice by the party claiming such extension is sent to the other party within thirty (30) days of the commencement of the cause. Times of performance under this Agreement may also be extended in writing by the City and Developer.
- 13. <u>Inspection of Books and Records</u>. The City has the right, upon two (2) business day's prior written notice and during normal business hours, to inspect and audit the books and records of Developer pertaining to the Services to be reimbursed pursuant to this Agreement.
- 14. Notices. All notices or other communications required or permitted hereunder shall be in writing, and shall be personally delivered or sent by reputable overnight mail service, first class, registered or certified United States mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, delivered or sent by telecopy or electronic mail transmission and shall be deemed received upon the earlier of (i) if personally delivered, the date of delivery to the address of the person to receive such notice, (ii) if sent by overnight mail via reputable courier or other delivery service, one (1) business day after the date of deposit with such overnight mail service, (iii) if sent by registered or certified mail, two (2) business days after the date of posting by the United States post office, and (iv) if sent by telecopy or electronic mail transmission, upon receipt, provided that the party giving notice shall deliver a copy of such notice to the other party by delivery of a copy of such notice by one of the other methods specified in this section, as follows:

- 15. <u>Assignment</u>. Developer may not assign its rights and obligations under this Agreement except with the approval of the City, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld if the assignment is to an entity owned and controlled by the principals of Developer that undertakes in writing to perform the obligations of Developer hereunder, provided, however, that such assignment shall not relieve Developer from the obligations undertaken herein.
- 16. Agreement is Entire Agreement. This Agreement contains the sole and entire Agreement between the parties concerning the Site and Project. The parties acknowledge and agree that neither of them has made any representation with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement or any representations inducing the execution and delivery hereof, except representations set forth herein. The parties further acknowledge that all statements or representations that heretofore may have been made by either of them to the other are void and of no effect.
- 17. <u>Attorney's Fees</u>. In the event either party shall bring legal action to enforce or interpret the terms of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorney's fees and court costs as part of its judgment.

REIMBURSEMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF GARDENA AND G3 URBAN, INC. FOR THE PAYMENT OF FEES AND COSTS FOR CONTRACT ENVIRONMENTAL, PLANNING, ENGINEERING AND LEGAL SERVICES RELATING TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF A 64 UNIT PROJECT LOCATED ON MARINE AVENUE

This Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into by and between the City of Gardena ("City"), a general law city, and G3 Urban, Inc., a California Corporation ("Developer") who agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Recitals</u>. This Agreement is made with reference to the following facts and circumstances:
- A. Developer holds interests in certain real property ("Property") consisting of 2.95 acres lo2315, 2403, 2415, 2421, and 2545 Marine Avenue (the "Property").
- B. Developer filed applications for development of a 64 unit live-work project on the Property. In order to develop the Project in the Mixed-Use Overlay zone, Developer requires a tract map and site plan approvals (the "Project"). In addition to the listed entitlements, the Project will also require environmental review for compliance with California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") and a soils investigation study based on the Phase I and Phase II reports which were submitted to City by Developer.
- C. City does not have personnel with sufficient expertise to prepare and review the potential environmental documentation. In order for City to process the Project, City will need to hire an environmental consultant for CEQA purposes. The City has received a revised proposal from Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. to prepare the required environmental document (the "Environmental Consultant") dated February 26, 2019. A copy of the Proposal is attached hereto as Exhibit A.
- D. City also will need to hire a consultant to prepare the soils investigation study. The City has received a proposal from Mearns Consulting LLC ("Environmental Soils Consultant") dated March 5, 2019. A copy of the Proposal is attached hereto as Exhibit B.
- E. In addition, processing the project will also require services to be performed by the City's contract City Attorney's office, including but not limited to, drafting of ordinances, resolutions, staff reports, and review and revision of the environmental document.
- F. The work to be performed by the Environmental Consultant, Environmental Soils Consultant, and City Attorney's office shall collectively referred to herein as "Services."
- G. City believes it is in the public interest for Developer to pay for such Services. Further, City has adopted a Resolution which specifies that Developer will pay for City Attorney services on projects such as this.

H. Developer desires to move forward with the processing of its Project subject to the reimbursement obligations set forth herein.

2. Agreement to Pay for Services.

Developer agrees to pay for all costs and expenses related to the Services as provided for in this Agreement.

3. Environmental Consultant.

- A. Environmental Consultant shall provide the Services as set forth in the Proposal attached as Exhibit A on a labor fee plus expense basis. Until an Initial Study is prepared and studies are done, it is not known whether the environmental documentation will be a Mitigated Negative Declaration ("MND") or an Environmental Impact Report ("EIR").
- 1. The cost for a Mitigated Negative Declaration will be \$99,925, as further set forth in Exhibit A.
- 2. The cost for an Environmental Impact Report ("EIR") will be \$192,930, as further set forth in Exhibit A.
- 3. If the time to prepare the Draft MND or EIR or attend the meetings and hearings exceeds the time allotted in the Proposal, the Environmental Consultant will be on a time and materials basis at the rates specified in the Proposal.
- B. Upon execution of this Agreement, Developer agrees to deposit with City, the sum of \$76,630 for the Environmental Consultant which covers the Tasks 1 through 6 for both options and the cost of traffic counts. Once it is determined whether a MND or EIR will be required, Developer will be required to deposit additional moneys in an amount determined sufficient by the City.
- C. City shall provide Developer with statements of draws against the deposit as they occur.
- D. Developer understands that if it is determined that additional studies are necessary, Developer will be required to deposit additional monies to pay for such Additional Services.
- E. To the extent there is any inconsistency between this Agreement and the Proposal, the terms of the Proposal shall govern.

4. Environmental Soils Consultant.

A. Environmental Soils Consultant shall provide the Services as set forth in the Proposal attached as Exhibit B.

- B. Upon execution of this Agreement, Developer agrees to deposit with City, the sum of \$28,324 for the Environmental Soils Consultant.
- C. City shall provide Developer with statements of draws against the deposit as they occur.
- D. Developer understands that if it is determined that additional studies are necessary, Developer will be required to deposit additional monies to pay for such Additional Services.
- E. To the extent there is any inconsistency between this Agreement and the Proposal, the terms of the Proposal shall govern.

5. City Attorney Services.

- A. The City Attorney will provide Services for this Project on an hourly basis. The City Attorney's contract billing rate for this work is \$242.50.
- B. Upon execution of this Agreement, Developer agrees to deposit with the City an additional sum of \$20,000 as a deposit for City Attorney Services, and the invoices received for such Services shall be applied against this amount. Services covered shall include any time incurred on this Project from the date of original Project submittal, which date may proceed the date of this Agreement.
- C. City shall provide Developer with a monthly statement of draws against this deposit. However, until the Project is acted upon, City reserves the right to redact the bills if determined necessary in order to maintain attorney-client privilege and attorneywork product.

Deposits.

- A. Developer understands that no work will take place on this project until such deposits are made.
- B. At any time that City determines the deposit amounts to be inadequate, Developer shall replenish the deposits with the amount requested by City, within fifteen (15) calendar days of such request.
- C. Should the deposit not be replenished in the time and amount specified, City may direct that all Services be halted until such time as the deposit is replenished.
- D. All deposits will be placed in a non-interest bearing trust account. Developer understands and agrees that City will not pay interest to Developer on the deposits, and Developer will not seek interest payments from City.
- E. Upon completion of the Services, City will provide Developer with a final accounting of those costs and expenses, which accounting the Developer agrees will be conclusive, in the absence of manifest error. Should the total reimbursement amount be

less than the total amount deposited, City will refund any remaining deposit amount to Developer within thirty (30) days after determining the final reimbursement amount.

- 7. Other Costs. Developer acknowledges that the cost of Services does not include application, permitting, inspection, or other fees, which amounts shall be separately paid.
- 8. <u>No Guarantee of Approval</u>. Developer acknowledges that its payments and deposits described herein are not an indication that the City will approve the Project or that City staff will make a recommendation in favor of the Project. Nothing herein prevents the City from considering all feasible mitigation measures and if an EIR is prepared, all feasible alternatives. Even if the Project is not approved, Developer shall remain liable for all costs for Services.

9. <u>Independence of Consultants.</u>

- A. During the term of this Agreement, Developer will not directly or indirectly enter or propose to enter into any financial or business relationship with any of City's consultants that are working on the Project.
 - B. Developer hereby acknowledges and agrees as follows:
- i. City has sole discretion to select which of its employees or independent contractors are assigned to work on Developer's application;
- ii. City has sole discretion to determine which persons City will hire as consultants to work on Developer's application.
- iii. As between City and Developer, City has sole discretion to direct the work and evaluate the performance of the consultants whom the City hires to work on Developer's application. City retains the right to terminate or replace at any time any consultant who is assigned to work on Developer's application.
- iv. City has sole discretion to determine the amount of compensation paid to consultants hired by City to work on Developer's application.
- v. City, not Developer, shall pay consultants hired or assigned by City to work on Developer's application from a deposit account under the exclusive control of City, which is to be funded by Developer as set forth in this Agreement.
- C. City and Developer hereby acknowledge and agree that processing of Developer's application is not contingent on the hiring of any specific consultant.
- D. City and Developer hereby acknowledge and agree that Developer's duty to reimburse City is not contingent upon the approval or disapproval of the proposed Project, or upon the result of any action of the City.
- E. Neither Developer nor its officers, employees or agents, shall communicate with City's environmental consultant team during the term of this Agreement without prior

approval of the City, unless such communication is initiated by the environmental consultant to obtain information about the Project which is needed to prepare the Environmental Document.

10. <u>Termination</u>. Absent a formal withdrawal of the Project application(s), Developer shall not be entitled to terminate this Agreement. If Developer does formally withdraw the Project application(s), Developer shall remain liable for all costs for Services incurred through the date of termination.

11. Developer Default.

- A. Should Developer fail to perform any of its obligations under this Agreement, then City may, at its option, pursue any or all of the remedies available to it under this Agreement, at law or in equity.
- B. Without limiting any other remedy which may be available to it, if Developer fails to perform any of its obligations under this Agreement, City may cease performing its obligations under this Agreement and halt all Services relating to the processing of the Project.
- C. If any amounts remain owing to City, City may bring an action to recover all costs and expenses incurred by the City in completing the Services, together with interest thereon from the date incurred at the rate of 10% per annum, or at the maximum legal rate, whichever is greater.
- D. If the Project is approved and any amounts remain owing to City for Services, City may withhold permits and/or certificates of occupancy until all such amounts are paid.
- 12. <u>Indemnification</u>. Developer further agrees that to the fullest extent permitted by law, the Developer shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless, the City of Gardena and its officers, employees, volunteers, attorneys and agents (in the aggregate, "City Indemnitees") from any and all liability, demand, claim, action, or proceeding, whether actual or threatened, including by way of example but not exclusion, proceedings of an administrative or regulatory nature and proceedings that may be associated with alternative dispute resolution (an "Indemnified Claim") brought by third parties against any City Indemnities (including any advisory agency of the City), challenging the validity of any approvals granted for the Project, the Environmental Document concerning the Project, or seeking damages which may arise from this Agreement, other than liabilities. demands, claims, actions or proceedings caused by the sole negligence or willful misconduct to the City or any City Indemnitee. In any defense of any City Indemnitees. City shall have the absolute right to unilaterally select the legal counsel for such City Indemnitees (with the intention of using one law firm to defend all City Indemnitees unless conflicts of interest preclude such joint representation) and any experts or consultants deemed necessary by City in an exercise of City's sole discretion.

City shall promptly render notice to the Developer of the existence of the Indemnified Claim (a "Notice") and Developer shall defend the City Indemnitees at Developer's expense. City shall cooperate fully with Developer in the defense of any Indemnified Claim. In any Notice, City shall estimate the cost of its defense, which shall include but not be limited to actual attorney fees, court costs, expert witnesses and consultant fees, and all other costs that may arise out of, or be incurred by City in the defense of an Indemnified Claim. Upon such Notice, Developer shall promptly deposit funds equal to the first three (3) months of the Estimated Cost with the City and shall make additional deposits as and when required to fund the further costs of defending the City Indemnitees for such Indemnified Claim. City shall refund, without interest, any unused portion of the deposits once litigation is finally concluded or a dispute is resolved regarding an Indemnified Claim.

- 13. <u>Compliance with Law</u>. Developer will, at its sole cost and expense, comply with all of the requirements of all federal, state, and local laws now in force, or which may hereafter be in force, pertaining to this Agreement.
- 14. <u>Waiver of Breach</u>. Any express or implied waiver of a breach of any term of this Agreement will not constitute a waiver of any further breach of the same or any other term of this Agreement.
- 15. <u>Notices</u>. Except as otherwise expressly provided by law, all notices or other communications required or permitted by this Agreement or by law to be served on or given to either party to this Agreement by the other party shall be in writing and will be deemed received on: (i) the day of delivery if delivered by hand, e-mail (with confirmation of receiving party) and fax (both required), or overnight courier service, during regular business hours; or (ii) on the third business day following deposit, with postage prepaid, in the United States Postal Service and addressed to the contracting parties. Name, address, telephone numbers, and e-mail addresses of the Parties are as follows:

Either party may change its address for the purpose of this Section by giving written notice of the change to the other party.

- 16. <u>Successors</u>. This Agreement shall be binding on and inure to the benefit of the successors and assigns of the respective parties hereto.
- 17. Governing Law. This Agreement has been made in and will be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California, and exclusive venue for any action involving this Agreement will be in Los Angeles County.
- 18. <u>Partial Invalidity</u>. Should any provision of this Agreement be held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be either invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions of this Agreement will remain in effect, unimpaired by the holding.
- 19. <u>Integration</u>. This instrument and its attachments constitute the sole agreement between City and Developer respecting the above matters, and correctly sets forth the obligations of City and Developer. Any Agreements or representations by City to Developer not expressly set forth in this instrument are void.
- 20. <u>Construction</u>. The language of each part of this Agreement will be construed simply and according to its fair meaning, and this Agreement will never be construed either for or against either party, whether or not that party drafted all or a portion hereof.
- 21. <u>Authority/Modification</u>. The Parties represent and warrant that all necessary action has been taken by the Parties to authorize the undersigned to execute this Agreement and to engage in the actions described herein. This Agreement may be modified by written amendment. City's City Manager, or designee, may execute any such amendment on behalf of City.
- 22. <u>Counterparts.</u> This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which will be an original, but all of which together will constitute one instrument executed on the same date.
- 23. <u>Effective Date.</u> This Agreement shall be effective as of the date of submission of the applications on November 29, 2018, and cover all Services incurred after such date.

FOR VALUE RECEIVED, G3URBAN, a California corporation ("Maker"), promises to pay to the CITY OF GARDENA ("City"), or order, at 1700 W. 162nd Street, Gardena, CA 90247, the principal amount of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00), or as much thereof as has been provided by City under that certain Agreement to Assist Remediation of Contaminated Property and to Provide for the Development of Housing ("Agreement"). without interest prior to default, and at the rate of 6% per annum after default, calculated on an actual day basis using a 365-366 day year.

This Promissory Note ("Note") is made to secure repayment of predevelopment costs advanced by the City pursuant to the Agreement. Payment of the principle amount shall become due and payable if Maker fails to pursue entitlements for the Project defined in the Agreement for a period of one year, if Maker fails to commence remediation of contaminated portions of the Site within 6 months from receiving entitlements, if and when Maker fails to diligently pursue the remediation to closure by the appropriate regulatory agency, or if Maker fails to commence construction within 6 months from closure of the remedial action, or fails to complete construction of the Project within one year from closure of the remedial action.

Upon Maker obtaining a certificate of occupancy for the Project the principal amount of this Note shall be forgiven in full.

Maker waives any right of offset it now has or may hereafter have against the holder hereof and its successors and assigns, and agrees to make the payments caller for hereunder in accordance with the terms hererof.

Maker agrees to pay all costs and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, which may be incurred by City in the collection or the enforcement of any provision of this Note or the Agreement.

RESOLUTION NO. 6374

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, ESTABLISHING REGULATORY FEES FOR WHOLESALERS OR DISTRIBUTORS OF FIREWORKS IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 8.16.115 OF THE GARDENA MUNICIPAL CODE FOR CALENDAR YEAR 2019

WHEREAS, Chapter 8.16 of the Gardena Municipal Code authorizes the licensing and regulation of fireworks within the City of Gardena, and;

WHEREAS, Section 8.16.115 specifically authorizes the City Council to establish an annual regulatory fee to be paid by each fireworks wholesaler or distributor providing Safe and Sane fireworks.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY FIND, DETERMINE, AND RESOLVE, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. ANNUAL REGULATORY FEE. The annual regulatory fee for wholesalers or distributors of fireworks in the City of Gardena shall be Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000) for the current Calendar Year 2019. Said fee shall be apportioned to each wholesaler or distributor in accordance with Section 8.16.115

SECTION 2. PAYMENT OF REGULATORY FEE. Said regulatory fee shall be paid by, and only by, a wholesaler or distributor, as provided in Section 8.16.115.A. Each wholesaler or distributor shall submit to the City information, as reasonably requested by City, to evidence compliance with this provision.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> <u>EFFECT.</u> That this Resolution shall be effective immediately upon adoption by the City Council.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Resolution; shall cause the same to be entered among the original Resolutions of said City; and shall make a minute of the passage and adoption thereof in the records of the proceedings of the City Council of said City in the minutes of the meeting at which the same is passed and adopted.
