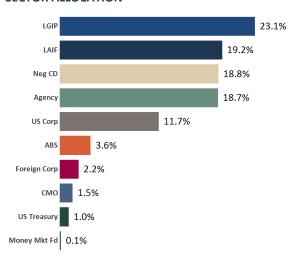

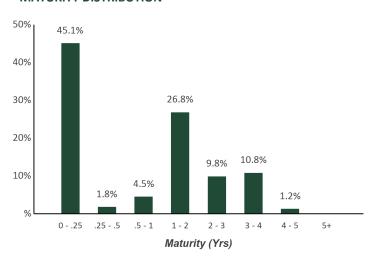

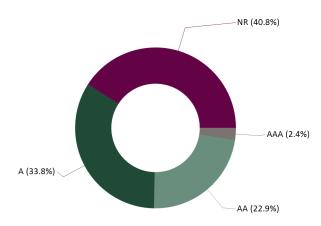
SECTOR ALLOCATION

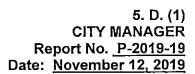

Larry Flynt's Lucky Lady Casino may advertise various names for this gaming activity. Should the Casino advertise a different name, the BGC ID (GEAR-001018) shall be referenced on all advertisements relating to this gaming activity.

Furthermore, all rules and procedures for the gaming activity, including but not limited to the following, shall be prominently displayed in the Larry Flynt's Lucky Lady Casino at all times the gaming activity is being offered for play:

- Eligible games and time periods.
- Qualifying hands and corresponding prize amounts.
- · Gaming activity collection fees.
- Availability of No Purchase Necessary.
- · Any other restrictions that apply to this gaming activity.

Eligible Controlled Games

The Fortune Pai Gow Poker Progressive Jackpot shall be attached to the following Bureau approved controlled games offered at Larry Flynt's Lucky Lady Casino, as shown below, at all times this gaming activity is being offered for play. All controlled game rules shall be played as previously approved by the Bureau.

• Fortune Pai Gow Poker 1.0 (GEGR-001812)

Object and Summary

The Fortune Pai Gow Poker Progressive Jackpot considers the best advertised qualifying hand(s) possible among each individual player's cards.

- To begin each round, players must make their regular base game wager. They may optionally place any bonus bets along with the optional jackpot fee of \$1.
- "Hockey Puck" discs will be attached to the table in front of each betting position. These
 discs have a sensor and will detect when a casino chip is placed on them. Players who
 wish to participate in the jackpot must place the optional jackpot fee on the sensor. The
 sensor will then light up.
- Once all players place their bets and/or jackpot fee, the house dealer will press "Coin In"
 on the keypad. The sensors will then light up, indicating participation in the progressive
 jackpot. The house dealer will then remove all jackpot fees from the table. The jackpot
 fees shall be dropped into a separate and locked jackpot collection box and accounted
 for separately.
- The house dealer then follows standard approved procedures for dealing the base game. A player can qualify for the jackpot element of the game regardless of the outcome of the base game.
- A player will win the posted prize if one of the below qualifying hands are achieved.



Qualifying Hands

Funding

The Casino will initially seed the jackpot at \$1,000. All extra prize amounts relating to "Prize Multipliers" shall be funded by the jackpot reserve fund. The Ultimate Texas Hold'em Progressive Jackpot shall be offered to customers who wish to participate for free, on a general and indiscriminate basis, with <u>no restrictions</u>. The Casino shall provide No Purchase Necessary tables for all patrons who request to participate in the gaming activity without paying a table fee or placing a live wager. <u>All advertisement material shall state "No Purchase Necessary" when referencing the Ultimate Texas Hold'em Progressive Jackpot.</u> This requirement extends to all forms of advertising including electronic message boards, computer monitors, posters, and flyers.

Equipment

The electronic software and digital reader related to and used in conjunction with this jackpot, which is used on each table eligible for this jackpot, has been tested, approved, and certified by the Gaming Laboratories International, LLC (GLI).

- 1. When a player has a progressive winner, the dealer shall press the appropriate hand button on the keypad.
- 2. The house dealer shall then contact a casino representative.
- 3. Once the casino verifies the progressive win, a casino representative shall insert the key and rotate it to "JPH" and then press "J-pot" button. This records the win onto the Game Manager. House procedures are then followed for paying the prize.
- 4. Returning the key to the "Run" position shall restore normal operation of the table, and adjust the meter appropriately for the prize won.
- 5. When the house dealer reconciles all action (on behalf of the player/dealer), he/she presses "Game Over." This resets the system to begin the next hand.
- 6. Once the "J-pot" button is pressed, the prize is logged into Game Manager.

On October 22, 2019, following a Public Hearing about the matter, the City Council voted, 5-0-0, to adopt Resolution No. 6403 approving a Wireless Facilities Policy. At the same City Council meeting, Council Member Dan Medina introduced Ordinance No. 1806.

Ordinance No. 1806 modifies the manner in which the City will process applications for wireless facilities in order to comply with federal rules and regulations.

References to complying with the Site Plan procedure for wireless facilities will be removed from the Municipal Code and a new section will be added which provides that wireless facilities will be processed in accordance with the policy that was adopted by City Council under Resolution No. 6403 on October 22, 2019.

ORDINANCE NO. 1806

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING CHAPTER 18.70 OF THE GARDENA MUNICIPAL CODE TO REGULATE WIRELESS FACILITIES DEPLOYMENTS ON PRIVATE PROPERTY, PUBLIC PROPERTY, AND IN THE PUBLIC RIGHTS-OF-WAY, AND AMENDING CHAPTER 18.04, CHAPTER 18.22, CHAPTER 18.24, CHAPTER 18.26, CHAPTER 18.30, CHAPTER 18.32, CHAPTER 18.34, CHAPTER 18.36, AND CHAPTER 18.44, ALL AS RELATED TO WIRELESS FACILITIES

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article XI, section 7 of the California Constitution and sections 36931 *et seq.* of the California Government Code, the City Council may make and enforce within its limits all local, police, sanitary and other ordinances and regulations not in conflict with general laws; and

WHEREAS, the City of Gardena (the "City") has not previously adopted detailed design regulations applicable to wireless telecommunications facilities, but has generally required site plan review in accordance with the provisions in Gardena Municipal Code Chapter 18.44 for wireless facilities on public and private property within the City's territorial and jurisdictional boundaries; and

WHEREAS, significant changes in federal and State law that affect local authority over wireless facilities have occurred, including but not limited to the following:

- 1. On November 18, 2009, the Federal Communications Commission ("FCC") adopted a Declaratory Ruling on the proceeding titled *Petition for Declaratory Ruling to Clarify Provisions of Section 332(c)(7)(B) to Ensure Timely Siting Review*, 24 FCC Rcd. 13994 (rel. Nov. 18, 2009) (the "2009 Declaratory Ruling"), which imposed procedural restrictions on state and local permit application reviews such as presumptively reasonable times for action. After a petition for judicial review, the U.S. Supreme Court in *City of Arlington v. FCC*, 569 U.S. 290 (2013), upheld the FCC's authority to issue these rules; and
- 2. On February 22, 2012, Congress adopted Section 6409(a) of the Middle Class Tax Relief and Job Creation Act ("Section 6409"), which mandated that State and local governments approve certain modifications and collocations to existing wireless facilities; and
- 3. On October 17, 2014, the FCC adopted a Report and Order in the rulemaking proceeding titled *Acceleration of Broadband Deployment by Improving Wireless Facilities Siting Policies*, 29 FCC Rcd. 12865 (rel. Oct. 21, 2014) (the "2014 Infrastructure Order"), which implemented regulations for "eligible facilities requests" and imposed new procedural restrictions on application reviews. The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit in *Montgomery Cnty. V. FCC*, 811 F.3d 121 (4th Cir. 2015), denied petitions for review; and

- 4. On October 9, 2015, Governor Edmund Brown signed Assembly Bill No. 57 (Quirk) into law, which creates a "deemed-approved" remedy for when a local government fails to act on applications for certain wireless facilities within the presumptively reasonable times established in the 2009 Declaratory Ruling and 2014 Infrastructure Order; and
- 5. On August 2, 2018, the FCC adopted a Third Report and Order and Declaratory Ruling in the rulemaking proceeding titled *Accelerating Wireline and Wireless Broadband Deployment by Removing Barriers to Infrastructure Investment*, 33 FCC Rcd. 7705 (rel. Aug. 3, 2018) (the "August Order") that formally prohibited express and *de facto* moratoria for all telecommunications services and facilities under 47 U.S.C. § 253(a) and directed the Wireline Competition Bureau and the Wireless Telecommunications Bureau to hear and resolve all complaints on an expedited basis; and
- 6. On September 26, 2018, the FCC adopted a Declaratory Ruling and Third Report and Order in the same rulemaking proceeding, FCC Rcd. —, FCC 18-133 (rel. Sep. 27, 2018) (the "September Order"), which, among many other things, creates a new regulatory classification for small wireless facilities, alters existing "shot clock" regulations to require local public agencies to do more in less time, establishes a national standard for an effective prohibition that replaces the existing "significant gap" test adopted by the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit and provides that a failure to act within the applicable timeframe presumptively constitutes an effective prohibition; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the changes described above, local authority may be further impacted by other pending legislative, judicial and regulatory proceedings, including but not limited to:

- 1. The "STREAMLINE Small Cell Deployment Act" (S. 3157) proposed by Senator John Thune that, among other things, would apply specifically to "small" wireless facilities and require local governments to review applications based on objective standards, shorten the shot clock timeframes, require all local undertakings to occur within the shot clock timeframes and provide a "deemed granted" remedy for failure to act within the applicable shot clock; and
- 2. Further orders and/or declaratory rulings by the FCC from the same rulemaking proceeding as the August Order and September Order; and
- 3. Multiple petitions for reconsideration and judicial review filed by state and local governments against the August Order and September Order, which could cause the rules in either order to change or be invalidated; and

WHEREAS, given the rapid and significant changes in federal and State law, the actual and effective prohibition on moratoria to amend local policies in response to such changes and the significant adverse consequences for noncompliance with federal and State law, the City Council desires to amend and add provisions to the Gardena Municipal

Code to allow greater flexibility and responsiveness to new federal and State laws in order to preserve the City's traditional authority to the maximum extent practicable (collectively, the "Amendments"); and

WHEREAS, on July 23, 2019, the City Council adopted Urgency Ordinance No. 1805 in order to immediately put in place new regulations and policies relating to Wireless Facilities; and

WHEREAS, on September 3, 2019 the Planning Commission held a duly noticed public hearing about this Ordinance and, at the close of the public hearing, adopted PC Resolution No. 10-19 recommending that the City Council adopt this Ordinance and the accompanying Resolution No. 6403 adopting the Wireless Facilities policy; and

WHEREAS, on October 22, 2019 the City Council held a duly noticed public hearing about this Ordinance and the accompanying Resolution No. 6403 adopting the Wireless Facilities policy, at which time it took into account all evidence received, both written and oral;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. FINDINGS.

The City Council finds as follows:

A. The facts set forth the recitals in this Ordinance are true and correct and incorporated into these findings by this reference. The recitals constitute findings in this matter and, together with the staff report, other written reports, public testimony and other information contained in the record, are an adequate and appropriate evidentiary basis for the actions taken in this Ordinance.

- B. The Amendments are consistent with the General Plan, Gardena Municipal Code and applicable federal and California law.
- C. The Amendments will not be detrimental to the public interest, health, safety, convenience or welfare.
- D. The adoption of wireless facilities regulations is necessary to protect the City's visual character from potential adverse impacts or visual blight created or exacerbated by telecommunications infrastructure and promote access to high-quality, advanced telecommunication services for the City's residents, businesses and visitors.
- E. The adoption of this Ordinance is necessary to preserve the public health, safety, and welfare as, without such adoption, wireless facilities approved without updated regulations could create: (1) land use conflicts and incompatibilities between comparable facilities; (2) visual and aesthetic blight and public safety concerns arising from the

excessive size, noise or lack of camouflaging of wireless facilities; and (3) traffic and pedestrian safety hazards due to the potentially unsafe nature of unregulated siting of wireless facilities in the public rights-of-way.

SECTION 2. ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW.

Pursuant to California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") Guidelines § 15378 and California Public Resources Code § 21065, the City Council finds that this Ordinance is not a "project" because its adoption is not an activity that has the potential for a direct physical change or reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment. Accordingly, this Ordinance is not subject to CEQA. Even if this Ordinance qualified as a "project" subject to CEQA, the City Council finds that, pursuant to CEQA Guidelines § 15061(b)(3), there is no possibility that this project will have a significant impact on the physical environment. This Ordinance merely amends the Gardena Municipal Code to authorize the adoption of regulations related to wireless facilities. This Ordinance does not directly or indirectly authorize or approve any actual changes in the physical environment. Accordingly, the City Council finds that this Ordinance would be exempt from CEQA under the general rule.

SECTION 3. ADOPTING CHAPTER 18.70.

Chapter 18.70, titled "WIRELESS FACILITIES," is added to the Gardena Municipal Code and provides, as follows:

18.70 WIRELESS FACILITIES

18.70.010 Regulation of Wireless Facilities

All new wireless facilities, and any modifications, collocations, expansions or other changes to existing wireless facilities, whether located on private property, public property, or within the public rights-of-way, shall be subject to the applicable permits, standards, procedures and other requirements as specified in the policy adopted by resolution of the City Council. Wireless facilities shall not be subject to the site plan review procedure of Chapter 18.44 of this Code.

18.70.020 Payment of Consultant Fees

All applicants for wireless facilities shall be required to reimburse the City for all reasonable consultant costs related to the processing of applications pursuant to this Chapter in addition to the application fee.

SECTION 4. AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 18.22.

Gardena Municipal Code section 18.22.020B which allowed wireless telecommunications facilities in the Parking zone subject to site plan approval is deleted in its entirety and not replaced.

B.— Wireless-telecommunications-facility, subject to-site plan-approval as required by Chapter 18.44.

SECTION 5. AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 18.24.

Gardena Municipal Code section 18.24.020F which allowed wireless telecommunications facilities in the Official zone subject to site plan approval is deleted in its entirety and not replaced.

F. — Wireless telecommunications facility, subject to site plan approval as required by Chapter 18.44.

SECTION 6. AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 18.26.

Gardena Municipal Code section 18.26.020C which allowed wireless telecommunications facilities in the Business and Professional Office zone subject to site plan approval is deleted in its entirety and not replaced.

C. -Wireless telecommunications facility, subject to site plan approval as required by Chapter 18.44.

SECTION 7. AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 18.30.

Gardena Municipal Code section 18.30.020l which allowed wireless telecommunications facilities in the Commercial zone subject to site plan approval is deleted in its entirety and not replaced.

I. — Wireless telecommunications facility, subject to site plan approval as required by Chapter 18.44.

SECTION 8. AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 18.32.

Gardena Municipal Code section 18.32.020H which allowed wireless telecommunications facilities in the General Commercial zone subject to site plan approval is deleted in its entirety and not replaced.

H. Wireless telecommunications facility, subject to site-plan-approval as required by-Chapter 18.44.

SECTION 9. AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 18.34.

Gardena Municipal Code section 18.34.020D which allowed wireless telecommunications facilities in the Heavy Commercial zone subject to site plan approval is deleted in its entirety and not replaced.

D.— -Wireless telecommunications facility, subject to site plan-approval—as required by Chapter 18.44.

SECTION 10. AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 18.36.

Gardena Municipal Code section 18.36.020N which allowed wireless telecommunications facilities in the Industrial zone subject to site plan approval is deleted in its entirety and not replaced.

N. — Wireless telecommunications facility, subject to site plan approval as required by Chapter 18.44.

SECTION 11. AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 18.44.

Gardena Municipal Code section 18.44.010 is amended as follows:

Site plans are required to be submitted for:

- A. Any development project for which a general plan amendment, zone change, conditional use permit, variance, tract map, or other discretionary permit is being sought in which case the site plan shall be processed concurrently with the other discretionary approvals;
- B. Any development project, including a wireless telecommunications facility, on property, public or private, fronting on the westerly or easterly side of Western Avenue from 182nd Street on the south to El Segundo Boulevard on the north;
- C. Any development project, including a wireless-telecommunications facility, on property, public or private, fronting on the northerly or southerly side of Redondo Beach Boulevard from Crenshaw Boulevard on the west to Vermont Avenue on the east;
- D. Any development project, including a wireless telecommunications facility, on property, public or private, fronting on the northerly or southerly side of Rosecrans Avenue from Crenshaw Boulevard on the west to Vermont Avenue on the east;
 - E. All new multifamily development of four units or more;
 - F. Those uses identified in the C-R zone as needing site plan review approval;

- G. Any use allowed by right or by conditional use permit pursuant to the mixed use overlay zone, but not including any use allowed by itself in the underlying zone;
- H. Any development in the R-1 or R-2 zone where the proposed development is out of character with the surrounding residential properties as determined by the community development director, based on floor area ratio ("FAR");
 - I. Accessory uses in commercial parking lots; and
- J. Wireless telecommunications facilities for any-location other than those specified in subsections B through D of this section; and
 - KJ. Any other development for which a site plan review is required by this code.

In addition, Gardena Municipal Code section 18.44.020B is amended as follows:

- B. The Planning Commission shall hold a noticed, public hearing and approve, conditionally approve, or deny site plans required by Section 18.44.010A through G or pursuant to any other provision of the Gardena Municipal Code.
- 1. Notwithstanding the above, the planning-commission shall only review site plans for wireless facilities when they are located-within the R-1-or R-2 zone or within three hundred-feet of any such zone.
- 21. Notice of hearings shall be given in accordance with Government Code Section 65091.

SECTION 12. CONFLICTS WITH PRIOR ORDINANCES.

If the provisions in this Ordinance conflict in whole or in part with any other City regulation or ordinance adopted prior to the effective date of this section, the provisions in this Ordinance will control.

SECTION 13. SEVERABILITY.

The City Council declares that (1) the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases in this Ordinance are severable; and (2) if any sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases in this Ordinance, or its application to any person, entity or circumstance, be determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unlawful, unenforceable or otherwise void, that determination shall have no effect on any other sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases in this Ordinance or the application of this Ordinance to any other person, entity or circumstance.

SECTION 14. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall take effect on the thirty-first (31st) day after adoption. At the time this Ordinance becomes effective, Ordinance No. 1805 shall be of no further force or effect.

SECTION 15. CERTIFICATION AND PUBLICATION.

The City Clerk shall certify the passage of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be entered in the book of original ordinances of said City; shall make a minute passage and adoption thereof in the records of the meeting at which time the same is passed and adopted; and shall, within fifteen (15) days after the passage and adoption thereof, cause the same to be published as required by law, in a publication of general circulation.

ORDINANCE NO. 1808

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, APPROVING ZONE CHANGE #3-18 CHANGING THE ZONING OF PROPERTY LOCATED AT 1515 WEST 178TH STREET FROM GENERAL INDUSTRIAL (M-2) WITH A MIXED USE OVERLAY (MUO) TO HIGH DENSITY MULTIPLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL (R-4)

(ZC #3-18; APNS: 6106-013-040 and 6106-013-041)

WHEREAS, on December 5, 2018, the applicant, Melia Homes, filed an application to develop a 114-unit residential condominium project consisting of attached three-story townhome style condominiums in 22 buildings on a 5.63 acre property located at 1515 West 178th Street (the "Property"); and

WHEREAS, in order to develop the residential project, the following entitlements (collectively, the "Project") are required: General Plan Amendment changing the land use designation from Industrial with a Mixed Use Overlay to High Density Residential (GPA #2-18); Zone Change to change the zoning from General Industrial (M-2) with a Mixed-Use Overlay (MUO) to High Density Multiple-Family Residential (R-4); Tract Map to create 114 airspace condominium lots (TTM No. 82390); and Site Plan Review for the proposed Project (SPR #11-18); and

WHEREAS, a Mitigated Negative Declaration ("MND") was prepared for the Project and the draft MND was circulated for a 20-day public review period between August 15, 2019, and September 3, 2019; and

WHEREAS, on September 17, 2019, the Planning and Environmental Quality Commission ("Planning Commission") of the City of Gardena held a duly noticed public hearing on the draft IS/MND and the approvals required for the Project at which time it considered all evidence, both written and oral; and

WHEREAS, at the close of the public hearing, the Planning Commission adopted PC Resolution No. 16-19 which approved the MND and adopted the Mitigation Monitoring Reporting Program ("MMRP") for the Tentative Tract Map and Site Plan Review and recommended that the City Council approve the MND for the General Plan Amendment and Zone Change; and approved PC Resolution No. 17-19 which approved the Tentative Tract Map and Site Plan Review and recommended that the City Council approve the General Plan Amendment and Zone Change; and

WHEREAS, on September 24, 2019, the City received an email from a resident indicating that they wanted to appeal the Planning Commission's decision primarily based on traffic and parking impacts ("Haase Appeal"); and

WHEREAS, during the September 24, 2019, City Council Meeting, prior to the resident being able to perfect the appeal, Council Member Henderson called the Planning Commission's item for review; and

WHEREAS, after the Planning Commission's September 17, 2019, hearing, the applicant submitted a revised Open Space Enlargement Plan dated October 2, 2019 modifying the open space to be more usable; and

WHEREAS, on October 22, 2019, the City Council held a duly noticed public hearing on the Project at which time it considered all evidence, both written and oral; and

WHEREAS, after the close of the public hearing and prior to adopting this Ordinance the City Council adopted Resolution No. 6405 approving the Mitigated Negative Declaration for the General Plan Amendment, Zone Change, Tentative Tract Map, and Site Plan Review and approved the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program for the Tentative Tract Map and Site Plan Review, and approved Resolution No. 6406 approving a General Plan Amendment changing the land use designation of the property to High Density Residential, and approving the Tentative Tract Map and Site Plan on the call for review;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN, AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1. APPROVAL AND FINDINGS – ZONE CHANGE.</u>

- A. Section 18.52.010 of the Gardena Municipal Code provides that the land use and zoning of property may be amended "[w]henever the public necessity, convenience, general welfare, or good land use and zoning practices require. . ." The City Council hereby approves the zone change for the Property from General Industrial (M2) with a Mixed Use Overlay (MUO) to High Density Multiple-Family Residential (R-4) as shown on Exhibit A, attached hereto.
- B. In taking this action, the City Council finds that the change is in the best interests of the general welfare and represents good land use planning practices, including, but not limited to the following reasons:
- 1. The property to the west is developed with a mobilehome park which has been negatively impacted by the industrial use at the Property. Residential condominiums will be more compatible with the adjacent mobilehome residential use.
- 2. The Property was designated with a Mixed Use Overlay designation which would have allowed housing of up to 30 units per acre and would have reduced the open space requirement from 600 square feet per unit to 150 square feet per unit. However, in order to build housing under the Mixed-Use designation it is necessary to have a component of commercial uses. Given the location of this Property, commercial uses would not be a viable option.
- 3. As there continues to be a need for housing in Gardena, and California in general, changing the land use designation to allow high-density multi-family housing makes good planning sense.
- 4. The change in zoning is consistent with the General Plan Amendment that was concurrently processed for this project.

SECTION 2. RECORD.

Each and every one of the findings and determinations in this Ordinance are based on the competent and substantial evidence, both oral and written, contained in the entire record relating to the Project. All summaries of information in the findings which precede this section are based on the entire record. The absence of any particular fact from any such summary is not an indication that a particular finding is not based in part on that fact.

SECTION 3. CUSTODIAN OF RECORD.

The Custodian of Record for the proceedings relating to the Project, including the MND and MMRP, is Raymond Barragan, Community Development Manager, City of Gardena, 1700 W. 162nd Street, Gardena, California 90247. SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall take effect on the thirty-first day after passage.

ORDINANCE NO. 1810

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA AMENDING CHAPTER 8.64 OF THE GARDENA MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO MAINTENANCE OF VACANT LOTS AND BUILDINGS

WHEREAS, the City of Gardena has determined that vacant lots and buildings can lead to neighborhood decline and can take from the aesthetics of community and the quality of life of the residents; and

WHEREAS, vacant lots and buildings can become nuisances, causing the City to incur costs and staff time in seeking to maintain and ensure acceptable conditions of these properties; and

WHEREAS, vacant lots and buildings can attract vagrants, and/or harbor wild animals, pests, rodents, vectors, and vermin; and

WHEREAS, vacant lots and buildings which have deteriorated or have been neglected are a threat to the public health, safety and welfare; and

WHEREAS, vacant lots and buildings can cause lowered property values for surrounding properties; and

WHEREAS, the City Council wants to set clearly defined standards for the maintenance of vacant lots and buildings;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN, AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. Findings.

The City Council finds that each of the "Whereas" clauses stated above are true and correct.

SECTION 2. Section 8.64.010 of the Gardena Municipal Code is hereby amended by adding the following definitions:

"Evidence of vacancy" means any condition or information that on its own or combined with other conditions would lead a reasonable person to believe that the property is an unoccupied residence. Such conditions include, but are not limited to, overgrown or dead vegetation, accumulation of newspapers, circulars, flyers or mail, past due utility notices or disconnected utilities, accumulation of trash, junk or debris, the absence of window coverings such as curtains, blinds or shutters, the absence of furnishings or personal items consistent with residential habitation, or statements by neighbors, passersby, delivery agents, or government employees that the property is vacant.

"Owner" shall mean any person, partnership, co-partnership, association, corporation, fiduciary or any other legal entity having a legal or equitable title or any interest in the property. For purposes of providing notice to an owner under this Code, "owner" includes the owner's agent, employee, or other legal representative.

"Responsible party" shall mean any person that is responsible for causing or maintaining a violation of this Code, including, but not limited to an owner, lessee, occupant, tenant, a person with a legal interest in the property, or a person in possession or control of the property."

"Vacant buildings" shall mean a building or structure which is unoccupied or for which there is evidence of vacancy, if the evidence of vacancy has existed for a period of at least sixty (60) days. Periodic visits to the property shall not constitute occupancy. The following do not constitute unoccupied residences: (1) properties which are actively under construction, (2) properties which are in escrow to be sold or transferred, or (3) properties that are actively being marketed for rent, lease or sale with contact information and that are being actively maintained for the purpose of attracting renters, lessees, or buyers.

"Vacant property" shall mean any property, lot or parcel that is undeveloped. A vacant lot shall not include lots for which construction on the lot is diligently proceeding to completion in accordance with Title 17 or 18 of this Code, or which a building permit has been issued and has not yet expired.

SECTION 3. Section 8.64.020 is hereby amended by adding the following:

- BB. To maintain any partially constructed building or structure, together with material and equipment used for construction, which is not completed within a reasonable time, or upon which there is a cessation of work for more than sixty (60) days, unless such completion or cessation of labor is caused by factors which are not within the control of the owner, such as war, labor strikes and litigation.
- CC. To allow a lack of maintenance of buildings, structures and landscaping, including lawns, trees, and shrubbery, which results in conditions out of harmony or conformity with the maintenance standards of adjacent property.
- DD. To maintain soil in such a condition, from whatever cause, that dust clouds form when the soil is disturbed by any cause.
- EE. To maintain property in a manner which is at variance with the level of maintenance of surrounding properties.
- FF. To maintain any building with broken windows, doors, deteriorating or peeling paint.

- GG. To improperly maintain landscaping visible from streets, rights-of-way, and adjacent properties at grade level which includes, but is not limited to untrimmed hedges and grass or dead, decayed or diseased trees, weeds and other vegetation.
- HH. To allow building exteriors, walls, fences, driveways, or walkways to be cracked, broken, defective, deteriorated, in disrepair, or defaced due to any writing, inscription, figure, scratches, or other markings commonly referred to as "graffiti."

SECTION 4. Section 8.64.025 is hereby added to the Gardena Municipal Code to read, as follows:

8.64.025 Vacant Properties and Buildings.

In addition to the nuisances established by Section 8.64.020, it shall also be a nuisance for a Responsible Party to fail to maintain a vacant property or building in accordance with the following standards.

- A. <u>Vacant properties and buildings shall be, in comparison to the neighborhood standard, kept free of weeds, dry brush, dead vegetation, trash, junk, debris, building materials, any accumulation of newspapers, circulars, flyers, notices (except those required by federal, state or local law), discarded personal items, including, but not limited to, furniture, clothing, large and small appliances, printed material or any other items that give the appearance that the property is vacant or abandoned.</u>
- B. The property shall be maintained free of graffiti, tagging or similar markings by removal or painting over with an exterior-grade paint that matches the color of the exterior of the structure. Visible front and side yards shall be landscaped and maintained to the standard of neighborhood properties.
- C. Pools and spas shall be kept in working order so the water remains clear and free of pollutants and debris or that could be a breeding ground for mosquitoes and other vectors, or drained and kept dry. In either case properties with pools or spas must comply with the minimum-security fencing requirements of the State of California.
- D. <u>Existing landscaping on the property and in the right-of-way shall be regularly maintained in a healthy and thriving condition.</u>
- E. <u>Vacant buildings shall not be left open or unlocked, or otherwise unsecured</u> from intrusion by persons, animals or the elements,

SECTION 5. CEQA Compliance.

A. This Ordinance is exempt from CEQA under the following provisions of the CEQA Guidelines:

- 1. Pursuant to California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") Guidelines § 15378 and California Public Resources Code § 21065, this Ordinance is not a "project" because its adoption is not an activity that has the potential for a direct physical change or reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment. Rather, it requires property owners to maintain existing properties that could become or have become blighted due to being vacant or unmaintained. Accordingly, this Ordinance is not subject to CEQA. Even if this Ordinance qualified as a "project" subject to CEQA, pursuant to CEQA Guidelines § 15061(b)(3), there is no possibility that this project will have a significant impact on the physical environment. The Ordinance merely amends the Gardena Municipal Code to authorize the adoption of regulations related to vacant lots. The Ordinance does not directly or indirectly authorize or approve any actual development. The primary changes in this Ordinance are to eliminate blighted conditions associated with vacant lots and improve the visual condition of the community.
- 2. CEQA Guidelines Section 15305 provides an exemption for minor alterations in land use limitations in areas with an average slope of less than 20% which do not result in changes in land use or density. There is nowhere in the City with an average slope of greater than 20%. The changes in this ordinance do not create any changes in land use or in density allowed in any zone.
- B. None of the exceptions to the exemptions set forth in Section 15300.2 are applicable. The changes in the ordinance will not impact any environmental resource of hazardous or critical concern. There is no cumulative impact relating to these changes, nor are there any unusual circumstances. There are no scenic highways in the City. The changes apply Citywide and the approval is not for a project on a Hazardous Waste Site.
 - C. Staff is directed to file a notice of exemption.

SECTION 6. Severability.

If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance, or any part thereof is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this ordinance or any part thereof. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase be declared unconstitutional.

SECTION 7. Certification.

The City Clerk shall certify the passage of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be entered in the book of original ordinances of said City; shall make a minute passage and adoption thereof in the records of the meeting at which time the same is passed and adopted; and shall, within fifteen (15) days after the passage and adoption thereof, cause the same to be published as required by law, in a publication of general circulation.

STAFF SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATION:

Staff respectfully recommends that City Council approve Resolution No. 6420 opting for the City to be included in a prospective 2020 revenue measure to fund critical fire protection and emergency services should the consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles County and the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors decide to pursue such a measure.

Since contracting with the Fire District in 2000, the number of total incidents in the City have increased from 4,840 incidents in 2000 to 6,765 incidents in 2018 or a 40% increase, with no significant staff increases. The City desires to provide fiscal sustainability for Fire and Emergency Services for our residents and address the City's continually evolving service demands. To meet established election deadlines, the City must advise the Fire District of their desire to opt in to the ballot measure no later than November 12, 2019, to be included on a potential revenue measure for the scheduled March 3, 2020 Election. Cost for the ballot measure would be borne by the Fire District.

The Fire District estimates Gardena based revenues from a potential revenue measure to be between \$2,432,000 and \$3,608,000 depending on the tax levy formulation determined by the Fire District. Absent this additional revenue source, the additional cost for Fire and Emergency Medical Services will be borne solely by the City's General Fund. The Fiscal year 2019-20 City of Gardena Adopted Fire and Emergency Services Budget is \$8,441,537.

Therefore, staff recommends that the City Council authorize the City Manager to issue a written notice and executed copy of the proposed resolution to the Fire District indicating that the City has determined to allow voters to decide on this important funding measure.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff respectfully recommends that Council approve Resolution No. 6420 opting for the City to be included in a prospective 2020 revenue measure to fund critical fire protection and emergency services should the consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles County and the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors decide to pursue such a measure.

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS:

The Consolidated Fire Protection District of Los Angeles County (Fire District) is considering a potential tax measure in 2020 that would provide critical funding needed for additional paramedic services, as well as facility renovations/replacement, vehicles, updated dispatch and communication systems, and critical equipment needs to ensure the continued safety of the public and firefighters. As the City of Gardena contracts for services with the Fire District, the Fire District has reached out to determine if the City Council is desirous of opting into the Fire District's ballot measure. If the City Council agrees, Gardena voters will be allowed to vote on a funding measure that would provide additional funding for fire protection and emergency medical services. Funds raised in each fee-for-service city will be allocated to a zone to ensure that funds will be expended within the city they are generated for major fire station repairs/replacement, additional paramedic services, and offsetting costs for equipment, vehicles, dispatching and communications equipment, etc., which would be specified in a resolution by the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors that places a measure on the March or November 2020 ballot.

Since contracting with the Fire District in 2000, the number of total incidents within the City have increased from 4,840 incidents in 2000 to 6,765 incidents in 2018 or a 40% increase with no increase in additional staffing. Analysis of calls shows that data represents a significant increase in medical incidents within Gardena. If a tax is approved by voters, the City and the Fire District will negotiate to determine appropriate staffing enhancements and Fire Station improvements to mitigate increased incident levels in the City and provide fiscally sustainable Fire and Emergency Services to address the City's continually evolving service demands.

The Fire District is currently considering placement of a measure on either the March 3, 2020 Ballot or the November 3, 2020 ballot. To meet established election deadlines, the City must advise the Fire District of their desire to opt in to the ballot measure no later than November 12, 2019, for the March election. Should a ballot measure be pursued and approved by the voters, the Fire District estimates Gardena based revenues would range between \$2,432,000 and \$3,608,000, depending on the tax levy formulation determined by the Fire District. Absent this additional revenue source, the additional costs for Fire and Emergency Medical Services in the City will be borne solely by the City's General Fund. The Fiscal Year 2019-20 City of Gardena

Adopted Fire and Public Safety Budget is \$8,441,537. Cost for the ballot measure would be borne by the Fire District. The City Council's agreement to opt in to the ballot measure would allow voters to decide whether or not to support additional funding for fire protection and emergency medical services.

To provide uniformity with FilmL.A 's film production processing procedures, the City should modify its film production ordinance to incorporate certain provisions from the Model Film Ordinance FILML.A. employed in Los Angeles County.

Ordinance No. 1813 makes minor revisions to definitions and application requirements, and provides an opportunity to cure prior to suspension or revocation of a permit.

FilmLA is the official film office for the City and County of Los Angeles, as well as many other cities in the County. FilmLA has completed more than 273,000 permitted days of on-location film production, provided more than 100,000 permits for film industry customers, and has processed thousands of licenses for filming or parking at public area schools.

WHEREAS, the City intends to have film permit processing conducted through contract with a film permit processing service; and

WHEREAS, to provide uniformity with film production processing procedures adopted by other cities using permit processing services, the City will be required to modify its film production ordinance to incorporate certain provisions from the Model Film Ordinance FILML.A.REV employed in Los Angeles County.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Section 5.36.020 of the Gardena Municipal Code is amended to read, as follows:

5.36.020 Definitions.

For purposes of his chapter, unless otherwise apparent from the context, certain words and phrases used in this chapter are defined as follows:

- A. "Charitable Films" shall mean motion pictures, television, still photography, or videotapes, produced by a nonprofit organization, which qualifies under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code as a charitable organization. No person, directly or indirectly, shall receive a profit from the marketing and production of the film or from showing the films, tapes or photos.
- B. "Film Production" shall mean and include all activity attendant to <u>prepping</u>, <u>striking</u>, staging or shooting motion pictures, television shows or programs, still photography, and commercials.
- C. "News Media" shall mean the photographing, filming or videotaping for the purpose of spontaneous, unplanned television news broadcast or reporting for print media by reporters, photographers or cameramen.
- D. "Student Filming" shall mean the photographing, filming or videotaping for educational purposes with a letter from the school verifying the student status and certifying that the educational institution will retain the rights to the project, or verify that the project will not be used for commercial purposes.
- E. "Studio" shall mean a fixed place of business <u>certified as such by the local fire authority</u> where filming activities are regularly conducted upon the premises.
- **SECTION 2**. Subsection 5.36.050(A) of the Gardena Municipal Code (Permit Requirements and Issuance) is amended to read, as follows:
- A. The applicant for a film production permit shall complete and file a permit application, in a form provided by the City, which shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

- 1. Evidence of Workers' Compensation Insurance coverage demonstrating conformance with all applicable federal and state requirements for worker's compensation insurance for all persons operating under the permit, including any off-duty City employee e.g., off-duty police officer, who is directly employed by the film production.
- The applicant has submitted a policy of general liability insurance of not less than \$1,000,000.00 single limit which insures the city, its officers and employees against any liability, or claims of liability, brought or made by or on behalf of any person for personal injury or property damage caused by or arising out of any negligent act or omission of either the applicant, its agents or employees, including any officers or employees of the city, or caused by or arising out of the condition of any city-owned or controlled property, whether real or personal, and occurring during the period and as a result of the activities for which the permit is to be issued; and for all vehicles operated by applicant under the permit, Business Auto Coverage under standard ISO form including symbol 1 (All Auto) auto coverage with limits of no less than \$1,000,000.00 and scheduled under any umbrella policy. However, the community development director or designee shall have the authority to require higher limits if, in his or her opinion and discretion, the type of activity thus permitted is of such a nature as to warrant greater risk protection. It shall be permissible in satisfaction of the requirement imposed by this subsection that the applicant cause the issuance of a certificate of insurance, for at least the required amount of coverage, which indicates that, by endorsement thereto, City of Gardena, its officers, employees and agents have been added as additional insureds.
- 3. Applicant has executed an agreement to defend and to hold the City, its officers and employees harmless, from any and all claims and liability of any kind whatsoever resulting from or arising out of the issuance of a film production permit by the City.
- 4. Designation of City facilities or public streets applicant requests to use in the activity for which the film production permit is to be obtained. Use of such City facilities or public streets is subject to a permit fee as provided in chapter 11.08 of this Code or by resolution of the City Council.
- 5. Designation by applicant of any on-duty City personnel necessary and requested to assist the film production. Applicant shall deposit with the City the reasonable estimated costs for on-duty City personnel to assist in the film production, which costs shall account for the hourly rates for such employees as indicated in the salary schedule maintained by the City, employee benefits, and the City's administrative costs in providing such personnel. Applicant shall be responsible for and pay the cost of all City personnel, whether on-duty or off-duty, used for film production during the period of this permit.
 - 6. Payment of all permit and business license fees required by this title.
 - 7. Proof of Filming Permit from Los Angeles County Fire Department.
 - 8. The following information:
- a. The name of the property-owner, address and telephone number of the location at which the film production is to be conducted;
 - a. The specific location of film production within such address or place;
 - b. The inclusive hours and dates such activity will transpire;

- c. A detailed statement of the nature of the proposed film production;
- d. The name, address and telephone number of the person or persons in charge of such film production;
 - e. The exact number of personnel to be involved in such activity;
 - f. Description of any animals or pyrotechnics to be used in the activity; and
- g. The exact amount and type of vehicles and equipment to be involved in the activity.

SECTION 3. Subsection 5.36.060(A) of the Gardena Municipal Code is amended to read, as follows:

- A. The following film production is exempt from this chapter:
 - News media activities.
 - 2. Film production conducted at a licensed certified studio.
- 3. Photographing, filming or videotaping conducted solely for private, non-commercial use, provided such activity will not unduly interfere with vehicular traffic, pedestrian movement or with the rights of nearby residents to the quiet enjoyment of their property, and will not be detrimental

SECTION 4. Section 5.36.070 of the Gardena Municipal Code is amended by to read as follows:

5.36.070 Suspension or revocation of permit.

The community development director or his/her designee shall have the authority, after notice, an opportunity to cure and an opportunity for a hearing, to suspend or revoke any permit issued hereunder where the terms and conditions of said permit have been violated or ignored or where the public safety or welfare is endangered by the permitted activity. Provided however, that whenever there is an imminent danger to the public health, safety or welfare from activities conducted by the permittee to the extent that immediate action is necessary to protect the public, the community development director or their designee shall have the authority to immediately suspend a permit pending a hearing.

SECTION 5. Severability. If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance, or any part thereof is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this ordinance or any part thereof. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase be declared unconstitutional.

SECTION 6. Certification. The City Clerk shall certify the passage of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be entered in the book of original ordinances of said City; shall make a minute passage and adoption thereof in the records of the meeting at which time the same is passed and adopted; and shall, within fifteen (15) days after the passage and adoption thereof,

cause the same, or a summary thereof, to be published as required by law, in a publication of general circulation.

SECTION 7. Effective Date. This ordinance shall not become effective or be in force until thirty (30) days from and after the date of its adoption.

 Adopt Urgency Ordinance No. 1812. An urgency ordinance requires four Affirmative votes for adoption.

RECOMMENDATION AND STAFF SUMMARY:

Staff respectfully recommends that the City Council approve Urgency Ordinance No. 1812 to temporarily prohibit no-fault evictions through December 31, 2019.

Assembly Bill 1482 ("AB 1482"), the Tenant Protections Act of 2019, was passed to address a key cause of California's affordable housing crisis by preventing excessive rent increases and arbitrary evictions. The bill prohibits evictions without "just cause" and prohibits owners of multifamily residential rental property from increasing rent each year more than five percent plus the percentage change in the cost of living. AB 1482 will be effective on January 1, 2020.

Since vacant units can initially be rented at market rather than be limited to the rental increase caps of AB 1482, several Gardena Owners are attempting to evict some or all of their tenants prior to January 1, 2020. As an example, in two buildings with an aggregate of 34 occupied units, all tenants have received notices to vacate before the end of the year. Additional cases of mass evictions have also been brought to the attention of staff.

It appears that an extraordinary number of tenants will be evicted unless this urgency ordinance is adopted.

Urgency Ordinance No. 1812 will prohibit no-fault evictions prior to the effective date of AB 1482 to prevent an impending surge of tenant evictions. Therefore, a temporary prohibition on no-fault evictions will protect a substantial number of Gardena residents from being displaced.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff respectfully recommends that the City Council adopt Urgency Ordinance No. 1812.

BACKGROUND:

On October 8, 2019, Assembly Bill 1482 ("AB 1482"), the Tenant Protections Act of 2019, was passed to address a key cause of California's affordable housing crisis by preventing rent gouging and arbitrary evictions.

The bill prohibits evictions without "just cause" and prohibits owners of multifamily residential rental property from increasing rent each year more than five percent plus the percentage change in the cost of living. AB 1482 will be effective on January 1, 2020.

Urgency Ordinance No. 1812 will prohibit no-fault evictions prior to the effective date of AB 1482. This measure is designed to prevent an impending surge of tenant evictions. Because vacant units can be initially rented at market rather than be limited to the rental increase caps of AB 1482, a number of landlords are attempting to evict some or all of their tenants prior to January 1, 2020.

Two representative examples that have come to the attention of staff through administration of the City's rent mediation ordinance are:

- In Rent Mediation Case No. 486, all 22 units of the property received 60 Day Notices to Terminate Tenancy. Absent adoption of Urgency Ordinance No. 1812, this would cause the residents of 22 units to vacate their units by December 1, 2019.
- On October 25, 2019, the City received rent mediation requests for substantial rent increases at all 12 units in an apartment building. Those units also received 60 Day Notices to Terminate Tenancy. Absent adoption of Urgency Ordinance No. 1812, all 12 units will be required to vacate by December 31, 2019.

Other similar examples have been brought to the attention of staff and it appears that an extraordinary number of tenants will be evicted unless this urgency ordinance is adopted.

Residents of the City of Gardena are experiencing a housing affordability crisis which is driving homelessness and displacement of residents at an unprecedented scale. If Ordinance No. 1812 is not enacted it is obvious that these problems will be greatly exacerbated. A temporary prohibition on no-fault evictions will protect Gardena residents from being displaced.

CEQA

This ordinance is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act in that it is not a "project" because its adoption is not an activity that has the potential for a direct physical change or reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment.

IN CONCLUSION:

Staff respectfully recommends that Council adopt Urgency Ordinance No. 1812 to temporarily prohibit no-fault evictions through December 31, 2019.

URGENCY ORDINANCE NO. 1812

AN URGENCY ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, ADDING CHAPTER 14.17 TO THE GARDENA MUNICIPAL CODE TO TEMPORARILY PROHIBIT NO-FAULT EVICTIONS THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 2019

WHEREAS, the California legislature passed the Tenant Protection Act of 2019, Assembly Bill 1482 ("AB 1482"), an act adding and repealing Sections 1946.2, 1947.12, and 1947.13 of the California Civil Code, effective beginning January 1, 2020, which prohibits evictions without "just cause" and owners of residential rental property from increasing rents each year more than 5 percent plus the percentage change in the cost of living or 10 percent, whichever is lower; and

WHEREAS, in advance of the implementation of AB 1482, no-fault eviction notices and threats of eviction have surged in the City of Gardena; and

WHEREAS, the Gardena City Council wishes to protect renters from no-fault evictions through December 31, 2019, in advance of AB 1482's effective date, to prevent homelessness and displacement.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. A new Chapter 14.17 is added to Title 14 of the Gardena Municipal Code to read, as follows:

CHAPTER 14.17 TEMPORARY PROHIBITION OF NO-FAULT EVICTIONS

Section 14.17.010 Purpose.

On October 8, 2019, Assembly Bill 1482 ("AB 1482"), the Tenant Protections Act of 2019, was passed to address a key cause of California's affordable housing crisis by preventing rent gouging and arbitrary evictions. AB 1482 becomes effective on January 1, 2020.

Southern California is experiencing a housing affordability crisis, which is driving homelessness and displacement of residents to an unprecedented scale. A significant number of the City's renters are currently rent burdened paying over 30 percent of their income on rent.

Rapidly escalating real estate values provide an incentive to landlords to evict long-term, lower-income tenants, without cause, to raise rents and attract wealthier tenants, before AB 1482 becomes effective. The City Council has been made aware that all the tenants in several multi-unit apartment buildings have received such eviction notices effective prior to January 1, 2020. Therefore, it is imperative that the City implement temporary strategies to keep people housed.

This article will temporarily prohibit no-fault evictions through December 31, 2019, for residential real property that will be covered by AB 1482 beginning on January 1, 2020.

Section 14.17.020 Definitions.

The following words and phrases, whenever used in this article, shall be construed as defined in this section.

Owner. The term "owner" is any person, acting as principal or through an agent, offering residential real property for rent, and includes a predecessor in interest to the owner.

Residential real property. The term "residential real property" is any dwelling or unit that is intended or used for human habitation.

Section 14.17.030 Prohibition on evictions.

A. Through December 31, 2019, the owner of residential rental property shall not terminate a lawful tenancy without at-fault just cause, unless the termination is required to comply with an order issued by a government agency or court necessitating vacating the residential real property or to comport with due process, federal, or state law, which shall be stated in the written notice of termination of tenancy. This prohibition shall also apply to an owner's action that constitutes constructive eviction under California law. An owner's failure to comply with this article shall render any notice of termination of tenancy void. This article may be asserted as an affirmative defense in an unlawful detainer action. An owner's failure to comply with this article does not constitute a criminal offense.

- B. At-fault just cause is the following:
 - 1. Default in the payment of rent.
- 2. A breach of a material term of the lease, as described in paragraph (3) of Section 1161 of the California Code of Civil Procedure, including, but not limited to, violation of a provision of a lease after being issued a written notice to correct the violation.
- 3. Maintaining, committing, or permitting the maintenance or commission of a nuisance as described in paragraph (4) of Section 1161 of the California Code of Civil Procedure.
- 4. Criminal activity by the tenant on the residential real property, including any common areas, or any criminal activity or criminal threat, as defined in subdivision (a) of Section 422 of the California Penal Code, on or off the residential real property against the owner of the residential real property.
- 5. Assigning or subletting the premises in violation of the tenant's lease, as described in paragraph (4) of Section 1161 of the California Code of Civil Procedure.
- 6. The tenant's refusal to allow the owner to enter the residential real property as authorized by Sections 1101.5 and 1954 of the California Civil Code and Sections 13113.7 and 17926.1 of the California Health and Safety Code.
- 7. Using the premises for an unlawful purpose as described in paragraph (4) of Section 1161 of the California Code of Civil Procedure.
- 8. The employee, agent, or licensee's failure to vacate after their termination as an employee, agent, or a licensee as described in paragraph (1) of Section 1161 of the California Code of Civil Procedure.

- 9. When the tenant fails to deliver possession of the residential real property after providing the owner written notice as provided in Section 1946 of the California Civil Code of the tenant's intention to terminate the hiring of the real property, or makes a written offer to surrender that is accepted in writing by the owner, but fails to deliver possession at the time specified in that written notice as described in paragraph (5) of Section 1161 of the California Code of Civil Procedure.
- C. This chapter shall not apply to any of the following residential real property or residential circumstances:
- 1. Transient and tourist hotel occupancy as defined in subdivision (b) of Section 1940 of the California Civil Code.
- 2. Housing accommodations in a nonprofit hospital, religious facility, extended care facility, licensed residential care facility for the elderly, as defined in Section 1569.2 of the Health and Safety Code, or an adult residential facility, as defined in Chapter 6 of Division 6 of Title 22 of the Manual of Policies and Procedures published by the State Department of Social Services.
- 3. Dormitories owned and operated by an institution of higher education or a kindergarten and grades 1 to 12, inclusive, school.
- 4. Housing accommodations in which the tenant shares bathroom or kitchen facilities with the owner who maintains their principal residence at the residential real property.
- 5. Single-family owner-occupied residences, including a residence in which the owner-occupant rents or leases no more than two units or bedrooms, including, but not limited to, an accessory dwelling unit or a junior accessory dwelling unit.
- 6. A duplex in which the owner occupied one of the units as the owner's principal place of residence at the beginning of the tenancy, so long as the owner continues in occupancy.
- 7. Housing that has been issued a certificate of occupancy within the. previous 15 years.
- 8. Residential real property that is alienable separate from the title to any other dwelling unit, provided that the owner is not any of the following:
- (a) A real estate investment trust, as defined in Section 856 of the Internal Revenue Code.
 - (b) A corporation.
- (c) A limited liability company in which at least one member is a (c) corporation.
- 9. Housing restricted by deed, regulatory restriction contained in an agreement with a government agency, or other recorded document as affordable housing for persons and families of very low, low, or moderate income, as defined in Section 50093 of the Health and Safety Code, or subject to an agreement that provides housing subsidies for affordable housing for persons and families of very low, low, or moderate income, as defined in Section 50093 of the Health and Safety Code or comparable federal statutes.

Section 14.17.040 Application.

This chapter shall apply to tenancies where the tenant remains in possession and the period of notice required under California Civil Code section 1946.1 has not expired. This chapter shall also apply to tenancies where the tenant remains in possession after the period of notice required under California Civil Code section 1946.1 has expired but a judgment of eviction has not yet been rendered.

Section 14.17.050 Severability.

If any provision of this article is found to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, that invalidity shall not affect the remaining provisions of this article which can be implemented without the invalid provisions, and to this end, the provisions of this article are declared to be severable. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this article and each provision thereof irrespective of whether any one or more provisions are found invalid, unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable.

SECTION 2. Urgency Clause.

The City Council finds and declares that this urgency ordinance is required for the immediate protection of the public peace, health, and safety for the following reasons: The City of Gardena would suffer potentially irreversible displacement of tenants resulting from no-fault evictions during the period before AB 1482 becomes effective. The City Council, therefore, adopts this urgency ordinance to become effective immediately.

SECTION 3. Certification.

The City Clerk shall certify the passage of this urgency ordinance and shall cause the same to be entered in the book of original ordinances of said City; shall make a minute passage and adoption thereof in the records of the meeting at which time the same is passed and adopted; and shall, within fifteen (15) days after the passage and adoption thereof, cause the same to be published, as required by law, in a publication of general circulation.

RESOLUTIONS RELATING TO THE GENERAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION TO BE HELD ON TUESDAY, MARCH 3, 2020

INTRODUCTION:

In accordance with Section 2.24.100 of the Gardena Municipal Code, the municipal election shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in March of even-numbered years. The date for the 2020 Election will be March 3rd.

STATEMENT OF FACTS:

Gardena's General Municipal Election will be held on March 3, 2020, to select two members of the City Council for terms of four (4) years. In accordance with requirements as set forth in the Elections Code, the City Council must adopt certain resolutions in a timely manner pertaining to General Municipal Elections. The following resolutions are presented for consideration at this time:

- 1. Resolution Calling and Giving Notice of the Election;
- Resolution Adopting Regulations for Candidate Statements; and
- 3. Resolution Requesting the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County to Consolidate with the Statewide Presidential Primary.

Registered voters of the City interested in running for this office must complete the nomination process prescribed by State election law. The nomination period will be open over a four-week period beginning on Tuesday, November 12, 2019 and concluding on Friday, December 6, 2019.

In October 2017, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors approved the City of Gardena's request to consolidate and hold its general municipal election on the same day as the statewide election. Consolidating the City's election with the County enables the Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk ("County Registrar") to administer, manage and oversee many facets of the City's election, including services and tasks related to the complete and successful conduct of the election; provision of all election materials and equipment; the hiring, training and supervision of poll workers; printing and distribution of ballot materials; the tallying of votes; and canvassing of election results. The City Clerk's Office would continue to handle the candidate nomination filing process, Fair Political Practices Commission filings and publishing of official election notices relating to calling an election and nominations.

The proposed Resolution adopting regulations for candidates to elective office provides that a candidate, at his/her own expense, may choose to submit a Candidate Statement to be printed in the sample ballot/voter information guide, which is mailed to all registered voters in the City. The candidate must make an advance deposit, to cover the expense of typesetting, translating and printing, as estimated by the County Registrar.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

IN CONCLUSION, Staff respectfully recommends that the City Council adopt the attached resolutions pertaining to the General Municipal Election on March 3, 2020.

WHEREAS, under the provisions of the laws relating to general law cities in the State of California, a General Municipal Election shall be held on March 3, 2020, for the election of Municipal Officers.

SECTION 1. That pursuant to the requirements of the laws of the State of California relating to General Law Cities, there is called and ordered to be held in the City of Gardena, California, on Tuesday, March 3, 2020, a General Municipal Election for the purpose of electing two (2) Members of the City Council for the full term of four (4) years each, and to submit any proposed measure to the electorate.

<u>SECTION 2</u>. That the ballots to be used at the election shall be in form and content as required by law.

SECTION 3. That the City Clerk is authorized, instructed, and directed to coordinate with the County of Los Angeles Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk to procure and furnish any and all official ballots, notices, printed matter and all supplies, equipment, and paraphernalia that may be necessary in order to properly and lawfully conduct the election.

<u>SECTION 4</u>. That the Vote Centers for the election shall be open as required during the identified voting period, pursuant to Sections 4007 and 14401 of the Elections Code of the State of California.

<u>SECTION 5</u>. That in all particulars not recited in this Resolution, the election shall be held and conducted as provided by law for holding municipal elections.

<u>SECTION 6</u>. That notice of the time and place of holding the election is given and the City Clerk is authorized, instructed, and directed to give further or additional notice of the election, in time, form, and manner, as required by law.

<u>SECTION 7</u>. That the City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Resolution and enter it into the book of original Resolutions.

<u>SECTION 8</u>. The City Council authorizes the City Clerk to administer said election and all reasonable and actual election expenses shall be paid by the City upon presentation of a properly submitted bill.

RESOLUTION NO. 6415

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING REGULATIONS FOR CANDIDATES FOR ELECTIVE OFFICE PERTAINING TO CANDIDATES' STATEMENTS SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON TUESDAY, MARCH 3, 2020

WHEREAS, §13307 of the Elections Code of the State of California provides that the governing body of any local agency adopt regulations pertaining to materials prepared by any candidate for a municipal election, including costs of the candidate's statement.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDENA, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DECLARE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS.

- A. That pursuant to §13307 of the Elections Code of the State of California, each candidate for elective office to be voted for at an Election to be held in the City of Gardena on March 3, 2020, may prepare a candidate's statement on an appropriate form provided by the City Clerk.
- B. The statement may include the name, age, and occupation of the candidate and a brief description of no more than 200 words of the candidate's education and qualifications expressed by the candidate himself or herself. The statement shall not include party affiliation of the candidate, nor membership or activity in partisan political organizations.
- C. The statement of no more than 200 words must conform to the word count standards established by Section 9 of the Elections Code of the State of California.
- D. The statement shall be filed in typewritten form in the Office of the Gardena City Clerk/Elections Official at the same time the candidate's nomination papers are filed. Statements submitted in handwritten or via electronic media will not be accepted for filing.
- E. The statement may be withdrawn, but not changed, during the period for filing nomination papers, and until 5:00 p.m. of the next working day after the close of the nomination period.

SECTION 2. FOREIGN LANGUAGE POLICY.

A. Pursuant to the Federal Voting Rights Act, candidate statements will be translated into all languages required by the County of Los Angeles. The County is required to translate candidate's statements into the following languages: Spanish, Japanese, Korean and Vietnamese or other currently required languages as of the date of this resolution.

SECTION 2. FOREIGN LANGUAGE POLICY (Continued)

B. Los Angeles County will print and mail separate voter information booklets and candidate statements in the languages listed in Section 2, Subsection A to only those voters who are on the County voter files as having requested a voter information booklet in a particular language. The County will make voter information booklets and candidate statements in the required languages available at all voting locations, on the County's website and in the City Clerk/Elections Officials office.

SECTION 3. PAYMENT.

The City Clerk shall work with the County Registrar to estimate the total cost of Α. printing, handling, translating, and mailing the Candidate Statements filed, including the costs incurred as a result of complying with Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended, and require each candidate filing a statement to pay in advance to the City of Gardena his or her estimated pro rata share as a condition of having his or her statement included in the Official Sample Ballot Booklet/Voter Information Guide. The estimate is just an approximation of the actual cost that varies from one election to another election and may be significantly more or less than the estimate, depending on the actual number of candidates filing statements. Accordingly, the City Clerk is not bound by the estimate and may, on a pro rata basis, bill the candidate for additional actual expense or refund any excess paid depending on the final actual cost. In the event of underpayment, the City Clerk may require the candidate to pay the balance of the cost incurred. In the even of overpayment, the City Clerk shall prorate the excess amount among the candidates and refund the excess amount paid within 30 days of the election.

SECTION 4. MISCELLANEOUS.

- A. All translations shall be provided by state-certified professional translators.
- B. The City Clerk shall comply with all recommendations and standards set forth by the California Secretary of State regarding occupational designations and other matters relating to elections.

<u>SECTION 5. ADDITIONAL MATERIALS.</u> No candidate will be permitted to include additional materials in the sample ballot package.

<u>SECTION 6</u>. The City Clerk shall provide each candidate or the candidate's representative a copy of this Resolution at the time nominating petitions are issued.

<u>SECTION 7</u>. All previous resolutions establishing council policy on payment for candidates' statements are repealed.

<u>SECTION 8</u>. This resolution shall apply only to the election to be held on March 3, 2020, and shall then be repealed.

<u>SECTION 9</u>. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Resolution and enter it into the book of original resolutions.

The election shall be held in all respects as if there were only one election, and only one form of ballot shall be used. The election will be held and conducted in accordance with the provisions of law regulating the statewide primary election.

RECOMMENDATION AND STAFF SUMMARY:

Staff respectfully recommends that City Council approve Amendment 01 to Local Agreement CCTR-9077 and adopt Resolution No. 6421 authorizing the Mayor and the City Clerk to execute the agreement with the California Department of Education which has been approved as-to-form by the City Attorney. The Amendment provides additional funding for the Gardena Family Child Care Program (GFCC). It increases the current contract by \$356,675 from \$2,433,772 to \$2,790,447. This reflects an increase in payment of the Standard Reimbursement Rate per child day from \$47.98 to \$49.54.

GFCC provides quality, educational, subsidized child care in licensed family child care homes in Gardena and bordering cities. Services are provided to low-income families whose parents are employed, in school/training seeking employment or are incapacitated and require assistance. Support services are also provided for the benefit of the total family.

GFCC staff not only works with children and families but also offers technical assistance to family child care providers in the GFCC network in areas such as curriculum, the child care environment, behavioral problems, and developmental and age appropriate practices.

FINANCIAL IMPACT/COST:

Additional Revenue of \$356,675 from the Department of Education for the Family Child Care Program. No cost to the General Fund.

RECOMMENDATION AND STAFF SUMMARY:

Staff respectfully recommends that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 6422 approving a Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement and authorizing the Mayor to execute the Agreement on behalf of the City. Following that action, one City Council member should be appointed as a Director to the CCGA Board. and a second City Council member should be appointed as an Alternate. These actions should be recorded as minute resolutions.

The City of Gardena and the City of Inglewood recently withdrew from the California Cities for Self-Reliance Joint Powers Authority because that entity had become dysfunctional. However, both cities are interested in creating an agency to pursue the intended goals of the Self-Reliance JPA: promoting and protecting the operation of card casinos in their respective jurisdictions. The subject agreement would create a new Joint Powers Agency to do that.

The Inglewood City Council has already approved the attached Agreement and, once it is approved by the Gardena City Council, the two cities will recruit other members state-wide to erect a defensive wall against litigation, legislation, and administrative actions that currently threaten local revenues derived from card club operations.

The Agreement calls for each member Agency to contribute \$30,000 annually for operational expenses. This amount may not be increased without the subsequent consent of the Gardena City Council.

\$30,000 annually

JOINT EXERCISE OF POWERS AGREEMENT

creating the

CALIFORNIA CITIES GAMING AUTHORITY

("CCGA")

This Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into on its Effective Date by and among the Cities that approve and execute this Agreement (collectively called the "Parties" or individually called a "Party").

RECITALS

- A. The Parties to this Agreement all have an interest in the successful and orderly operation of the card casinos or card rooms in their respective cities due to the profound economic and social impacts of the card casinos or card rooms on each Party and its residents.
- B. The Parties all have adopted gaming ordinances by which they authorize, license, regulate and tax card casinos or card rooms within their respective jurisdictions.
- C. The Parties all have an interest in promoting and protecting the operation of card casinos or card rooms in their respective jurisdictions as well as in the gaming industry.
- D. The Parties all have inherent powers to act for the benefit of the health and general welfare of their residents and businesses.
- E. The exercise of these powers can achieve the most beneficial and extensive outcomes for the Parties and their respective residents and businesses through the formation and operation of a joint exercise of powers authority.
- F. Each of the Parties is authorized to contract with each other for the joint exercise of these common powers under Article I, Chapter 5, Division 7, Title I, commencing with Section 6500 of the Government Code of the State of California.

COVENANTS

The Parties agree as follows:

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DEFINITIONS

- 1.1 For the purpose of this Agreement, the following words shall have the following meanings:
 - (a) "Agreement" means this joint exercise of powers agreement.
 - (b) "Authority" or "California Cities Gaming Authority" or "CCGA" means the joint exercise of powers authority created by this Agreement.
 - (c) "Card Casino" or "Card Room" mean those facilities in which card games are authorized to be played by each respective Member in its city and by the California Gambling Control Commission.
 - (d) "Effective Date" means the date upon which this Agreement is approved and executed by any two municipalities or local entities. "Effective Date" also means the date upon which this Agreement is approved and executed by any additional municipality or local entity through an Addendum to this Agreement. "Effective Date" further means the date upon which an Amendment to this Agreement is approved and executed by the then Parties to the Authority.
 - (e) "Fiscal Year" means July 1 through June 30 or such other period as the Board of Directors shall establish.
 - (f) "Gaming" means gambling activities that historically have been authorized by local government; gambling activities which become permitted under state law at, arising from or related to a location where gambling activities have been authorized by local government, or gambling activities that state law permits a license to conduct where the licensee previously has conducted gambling activities under a license issued by a local government.
 - (g) "Original Members" means the cities of Gardena and Inglewood.
 - (h) "Party" or "Member" mean each entity that becomes a signatory to this Agreement directly or through an Addendum to this Agreement.

1.2 Rules of Construction

- (a) Unless the context clearly requires otherwise:
 - (i) The plural and singular forms include the other;
 - (ii) "Shall," "will," "must," and "agrees" are each mandatory;
 - (iii) "may" is permissive;
 - (iv) "or" is not exclusive;
 - (v) "includes" and "including" are not limiting; and
 - (vi) "between" includes the ends of the identified range.
- (b) The masculine gender shall include the feminine and neuter genders and vice versa.
- (c) Except as specifically provided herein, reference to any law, statute, ordinance, regulation or the like means such law as and when adopted, amended, modified, codified or reenacted, in whole or in part and in effect from time to time, including any ordinance, rule or regulation promulgated thereunder.

II.

JOINT POWERS AND PURPOSES

- 2.1 Powers Related to Gaming. Each Member has in common the powers to contract, legislate, license, regulate and tax gaming including card casinos or card rooms in its jurisdiction. The purpose of this Agreement is to jointly exercise any or all of these common powers and such additional powers as may be authorized by law, now or in the future, as appropriate, to establish, enhance, preserve and promote gaming in each Member's jurisdiction, and throughout the state, in order to generate economic development, employment, municipal revenues and other benefits that each Member derives or may derive from gaming for itself and its residents.
- 2.2 <u>Power to Lobby</u>. Each Member also has the power to lobby the California Legislature and the Congress about legislation that affects or relates to gaming within its jurisdiction and throughout the state and to lobby state and federal

governmental agencies and regulatory bodies such as the California Gambling Control Commission, the Department of Justice, the Bureau of Gaming Control, the Department of Consumer Affairs and the Bureau of Indian Affairs regarding approvals, licensing, regulations and other activities that affect or relate to gaming within each Member's jurisdiction and throughout the state. Thus, the purpose of this Agreement is to also jointly exercise the power to lobby state and federal governmental entities and officials in order to establish, enhance, preserve and promote gaming in each Member's jurisdiction and throughout the state and to protect gaming from threats and activities inimical to gaming.

- 2.3 <u>General Powers</u>. The Authority shall have the powers common to its Members and is hereby authorized to do all acts necessary or desirable to accomplish its purposes, including the following:
 - (a) To make and enter into contracts including an Addendum to this Agreement to admit new Members;
 - (b) To incur debts, liabilities or other obligations which are not debts, liabilities or obligations of any Member;
 - (c) To employ agents and employees;
 - (d) To acquire, construct, manage, maintain and operate any building, works or improvements;
 - (e) To acquire, hold, lease or dispose of property, personal or real;
 - (f) To sue or be sued in its own name; and
 - (g) To exercise all powers necessary or desirable to carry out the purposes of the Authority as set forth in this Agreement, or in any Addendum or Amendment to this Agreement, or in any ordinance or resolution adopted by the Board of Directors.
- 2.4 <u>Compliance with State Law</u>. The Authority shall comply with the laws of the State of California including the Ralph Brown Act.
- 2.5 <u>Board of Directors</u>. All of the powers of the Authority shall be exercised by a Board of Directors. On an annual basis, at its first meeting of each fiscal year or as otherwise directed by the Board or soon thereafter, the Board shall:
 - (a) Organize the Board of Directors;

- (b) Adopt a plan of projects and activities for the ensuing year;
- (c) Adopt a budget for the CCGA for the ensuing fiscal year; and
- (d) Establish an annual appropriations limit for the CCGA.
- 2.6 <u>Officials</u>. The Authority shall operate through an executive director and a general counsel whom the Board of Directors shall appoint. The Board may contract for such officials.
- 2.7 <u>Consultants</u>. The Board may hire consultants as may be necessary or desirable to achieve the purposes of this Agreement including the projects and activities of the Authority.
- 2.8 **Rules.** The Board may adopt, by ordinance or resolution, such rules and regulations for the conduct of its affairs as it deems desirable or necessary.
- 2.9 <u>Code of Conduct</u>. The Board shall adopt a code of conduct that shall regulate the conduct of its Directors, Officials, Employees, Consultants and Agents including the grounds for removal of Directors whether Regular or Alternate.

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ORGANIZATION

- 3.1 <u>Creation</u>. There hereby is created a public entity separate from its Members, which is named the "California Cities Gaming Authority" ("CCGA"). The CCGA is formed by this Agreement pursuant to the provisions of Article I, Chapter 5, Division 7, Title 1 commencing with Section 6500, of the Government Code of the State of California. The Authority shall continue in existence unless and until it is dissolved as set forth in Article VIII hereof.
- 3.2 <u>Membership</u>. The Members of the Authority shall be the Original Parties to this Agreement and any new Member that executes an Addendum to this Agreement by which the new Member agrees to the provisions of this Agreement and by which the then existing Parties agree to admit the new Member, and which have not withdrawn from the Authority pursuant to the provisions of Article IX hereof.
- 3.3 <u>Member Names</u>. The names, type of entity, and addresses of the Members shall be those set forth in this Agreement and in any Addendum or Amendment hereto.

- 3.4 <u>Board of Directors</u>. The Authority shall be governed by a Board of Directors ("Board") comprised of one member of the Legislative Body of each Member.
- 3.5 Appointment of Directors. Within thirty (30) days after the Effective Date of this Agreement as to the Original Members or the Effective Date of an Addendum as to a new Member, each Member shall appoint by resolution of its Legislative Body, one of its members to serve as Director of the Board ("Regular Director") and one of its other members ("Alternate Director") to serve in the absence of the Regular Director. Each Member shall transmit the resolution by which it has appointed a Regular Director and an Alternate Director to the Authority. Each Regular Director shall hold office from the first meeting of the Board after his or her appointment until a qualified successor is appointed. Each Director shall serve at the pleasure of the Legislative Body of the Member making the appointment and any Director may be removed at any time by the same Legislative Body.
- 3.6 <u>Voting</u>. Each Member shall vote on each and every agenda item or other matter before the Board. Each Member shall have one vote on each agenda item or other matter before the Board even where a Member's Regular Director and Alternate Director both attend the same meeting. A vote of a majority of the Board shall be necessary to transact the business of the Authority. Where a Director abstains from voting on an agenda item or other matter before the Board, such abstention shall constitute a "yes" vote on the item or matter before the Board to which the Director abstained except when a Director abstains on approving the minutes of a meeting of the Board that the Director did not attend.
- 3.7 **Principal Office.** The principal office of the Authority shall be established by resolution of the Board.
- Meetings. The Board shall hold one regular meeting each month unless directed otherwise by a resolution of the Board. The Board shall meet at each Member's City Hall and rotate the meeting place among the several City Halls, or at such other places as designated by resolution of the Board. The Board shall adopt an annual schedule of its regular meetings by resolution of the Board. The first regular meeting of the Board shall be held within thirty (30) days from the Effective Date of this Agreement. In addition, special meetings of the Board may be called by the Chairperson or by a majority of the Regular Directors by delivering written notice to each Director in the manner set forth in the Brown Act (Government Code Section 54956). All meetings of the Board may be adjourned to a time and place certain by a majority of the Directors present at the meeting at the time of the order of adjournment.

- 3.9 **Quorum**. In order to transact business and conduct the affairs of the Board, a quorum of its Members shall be in attendance; and a quorum of its Members means the presence of a majority of the Members.
- 3.10 Officers. The Directors of the Board shall appoint the following officers from among its members: Chairperson, Vice Chairperson and Secretary. The Treasurer of the Authority shall be the Treasurer of the City of Gardena, the Treasurer of the City of Inglewood, an officer or employee of the Authority, or a certified public accountant, as determined by the Board, for the term and on the conditions provided herein. The Treasurer shall also serve as the Auditor. The Board shall have the power to appoint such additional officers as it deems necessary or desirable. All checks drawn on the Authority's accounts shall be signed by the Chairperson or the Vice Chairperson, and by the Treasurer.
- 3.11 <u>Terms</u>. The Chairperson, Vice Chairperson and Secretary shall hold office for a period of one fiscal year commencing July 1 and ending on June 30; provided that any Director so appointed may continue to hold said Office for successive terms at the discretion of the Board and, provided further, that any such Director shall continue to hold said Office until replaced by another Director. However, the Chairperson, Vice Chairperson and Secretary appointed in the first year of the Authority shall hold office during the fiscal year in which the appointment is made and continue through the subsequent fiscal year ending on June 30.
- 3.12 **Qualifications**. In order to be qualified to serve as a Director and Officer of the Board, a Director shall be a validly-serving member of a Member's legislative body and shall have been appointed as a Director to the Authority by a resolution of a Member's legislative body. A Member's legislative body shall be the sole judge of its Member's qualifications to serve as a Director of the Authority.
- 3.13 **Duties of Officers.** The duties of the Officers of the Authority are described below:
 - (a) <u>Chairperson</u>. The Chairperson shall have the power to preside over the meetings of the Authority that includes the discretion to change the order of discussion of agenda items or matter before the Board, determine the order and time of debate on agenda items or matters before the Board, call for a vote on agenda items or other matters, and to make any motion. The Chairperson shall sign all contracts, ordinances, resolutions, and orders of the Board, which signature shall be required to validate such official documents and actions of the Authority. The Chairperson shall also perform such duties imposed or required by law and those duties designated by the Board.

- (b) <u>Vice Chairperson</u>. The Vice Chairperson shall perform the duties of the Chairperson in the absence of the Chairperson. However, the Chairperson shall not assume the duty of signing documents for the Authority unless the Chairperson is unavailable for a period longer that seven (7) days.
- (c) <u>Secretary</u>. The Secretary shall cause minutes of all Board meeting to be kept and provide copies thereof to all of the Directors once approved within fourteen (14) days following each Board meeting; provided that minutes shall not be taken of any closed session. The Secretary may delegate the duty of preparing such minutes. The Secretary shall also attest to the signature of the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson on all official documents of the Authority. The Secretary shall also perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Board.
- 3.14 **Treasurer**. The Treasurer shall do all of the following:
 - (a) Receive and receipt for all money of the Authority and place it in the treasury so designated to the credit of the Authority by the Board.
 - (b) Be responsible, upon his or her official bond, for the safekeeping and disbursement of all Authority money so held by him or her.
 - (c) Pay, when due, out of the money of the Authority held by him or her, all sums payable on outstanding bonds and coupons of the Authority.
 - (d) Pay any other sums due from the Authority money, or any portion thereof, only upon warrants of the Treasurer.
 - (e) Verify and report in writing on the first day of July, October, January and April of each year to the Authority and to the Parties to this Agreement, the amount of money he or she holds for the Authority, the amount of receipts since his or her last report, and the amount paid out since his or her last report. Alternatively, the Board may require the Treasurer to verify and report such information each month.
 - (f) Be bonded; and the amount of his or her bond shall be designated and fixed in the budget for each fiscal year pursuant to Government Code Section 6505.1 by the Board.
- 3.15 <u>Privileges and Immunities</u>. All of the privileges and immunities from liability, exemptions from laws, ordinances and rules, all pension, relief, disability, workman's compensation, and other benefits which apply to the activity of officers,

agents or employees of any such public agency when performing their respective functions within the territorial limits of their respective public agencies, shall apply to them to the same degree and extent while engaged in the performance of any of their functions and duties extraterritorially under the provisions of Article 1, Chapter 5, Division 7, Title 1 of the Government Code.

- 3.16 Government Claims Act. For purposes of any claim that may be made or any action that may be instituted against any Director, Officer or Official of the Authority, such person shall be considered an "employees" of the Authority pursuant to the Government Claims Act under Division 3.6, Title 1 of Government Code commencing at Section 810.
- 3.17 <u>Indemnification</u>. Each and every Director, Officer, Official and employee of the Authority shall be provided a defense pursuant to Part 7, Division 3., Title 1 of the California Government Code commending with Section 995.

IV.

FINANCING

- 4.1 Annual Contribution. The Authority shall be financed by an annual contribution from the Members in an amount that is not less than \$210,000 per fiscal year, which amount shall be used to pay the operating expenses of the Authority. The Board of Directors may increase the amount of the required annual contribution set forth above provided that the annual contribution shall not exceed \$420,000 unless and until the legislative body of each Member authorizes a higher annual contribution. Upon becoming a Party to this Agreement, each Member shall be obligated to pay a pro-rata share of the then established annual contribution provided that no Member shall be obligated to pay more than \$30,000 per fiscal year as its pro-rata portion of the annual contribution unless and until the Authority has seven (7) Members.
- 4.2 Payment of Annual Contribution. Each Member shall pay a pro-rata share of the annual contribution to the Authority based on the number of Members to this Agreement. The first annual contribution shall be payable within thirty (30) days following the Effective Date of this Agreement provided that the Board may prorate the amount of the annual contribution based on the number of months remaining in the fiscal year in which the Authority shall have been formed. Thereafter, the annual contribution for each fiscal year shall be payable within thirty (30) days of the commencement of fiscal year or July 1, 2020. Each Member shall be invoiced for its pro-rata portion of the annual contribution no later than June 30 of each year.

- 4.3 <u>Revenues</u>. The Authority may also be financed by contributions from card casino or card rooms including any card casino or card room licensed by any Member. The Authority may also be financed from fees or taxes imposed on any card casino or card room licensed by any Member or by the Authority. No card casino or card room may become a party to this Agreement, a Member of the Authority or have a vote on the Board.
- 4.4 Excess Revenue. Any excess revenue collected from any Member or other source by the Authority shall be applied to reduce the operating expenses of the Authority in the following fiscal year.
- 4.5 <u>Budget Reserves</u>. The Board shall determine on an annual basis, prior to the beginning of the fiscal year, a level of reasonable cash reserves to be accumulated by the Authority. This reserve shall be accumulated from revenues collected in excess of all actual expenses of the Authority.

V.

STRICT ACCOUNTABILITY

- 5.1 <u>Strict Accountability</u>. The Treasurer shall provide for the strict accountability of all funds of the Authority and report of all receipts and disbursements. The Treasurer shall maintain full books and accounts for the Authority in accordance with practices established by, or consistent with, those utilized by the Controller of the State of California for like public entities. In particular, the Treasurer shall comply with the requirement of the strict accountability for joint powers authorities in Article 1, Chapter 5, Division 7, Title 1 of the Government Code.
- Audit. Pursuant to Government Code Section 6505, the Auditor shall contract with a certified public accountant to make an annual audit of the accounts and records of the Authority that shall comply with the minimum requirements prescribed by the Controller for special districts under Government Code Section 26909 and shall conform to generally accepted auditing standards; provided that the Board may, by unanimous vote, replace the annual special audit with an audit covering a two-year period. The cost of said audits shall be borne by the Authority. When such an audit is made, a report thereof shall be filed with each Member of the Authority and the County Auditor within 12 months of the end of the fiscal year or years under examination.
- 5.3 <u>Custodian of Records</u>. By resolution, the Board shall appoint a custodian of records who will maintain, store and safeguard the Authority's financial and legal documents and produce them upon the Board's request.

VI.

LIABILITIES OF THE AUTHORITY

Liabilities. The debts, liabilities and obligations of the Authority shall be the debts, liabilities or obligations of the Authority alone and not of the Members, including ex officio Members. However, a Member separately may contract for, or otherwise assume responsibility for specific debts, liabilities, or obligations of the Authority, and no other Member then shall be liable, therefore.

VII.

ADDITION AND WITHDRAWAL OF MEMBERS

- 7.1 <u>Admission of Members</u>. Additional governmental entities may become Members of the Authority upon such terms and conditions as may be provided by the Board with the consent of two-thirds vote of the Board, and evidenced by the execution of a written Amendment to this Agreement by all Members, including the additional Member. The addition of new Members shall not affect any other rights of existing Members without the consent of all affected Members.
- 7.2 <u>Voluntary Withdrawal</u>. Any Member may withdraw from the Authority at any time upon giving each of the other Members written notice thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of its desired withdrawal; provided, however, that any withdrawing Member shall be obligated to contribute its pro-rata portion of the annual contribution and its pro-rata share of the liabilities of the Authority for the fiscal year in which it withdraws becomes effective.
- 7.3 <u>Expulsion of Members</u>. A majority of the Directors may expel a Member upon a finding that a Member has failed to pay its annual contribution or that a Member, through its legislative body, has taken a position contrary to a position taken by the Board or a position that is inimical to the interests of the Authority.

VIII.

DISSOLUTION

8.1 Term. The Authority shall continue in existence unless and until dissolved in accordance with the terms of this Article VIII.

- 8.2 <u>Dissolution</u>. The Authority shall not be dissolved until all of the current funds of the Authority are applied to the current debts and liabilities of the Authority. The current funds of the Authority shall not include the annual contribution of any subsequent fiscal year even where the invoices for the pro-rata annual contributions have been submitted to the Members.
- **8.3** <u>Dissolution Vote</u>. Subject to Section 8.2 above, the Authority may be dissolved by a majority affirmative vote of the Board.
- 8.4 <u>Disposition of Property Upon Dissolution</u>. Upon dissolution of the Authority, any surplus funds on hand shall be returned to the then Members in proportion to the annual contributions made. Upon an affirmative vote to dissolve in accordance with Section 8.3 above, the Board shall offer any asset, rights and interests of the Authority for sale to the Members at not less than Fair Market Value. In the event that two or more Members of the Authority wish to purchase any asset, the Member who offers the highest price shall have the right to purchase the asset. If no such sale is consummated within a reasonable period of time, the Board shall then offer the asset, rights and interests for sale to any other third party for good and adequate consideration which shall not be less than Fair Market Value. The net proceeds from any sale shall be distributed among the then Members in proportion to the contributions made.

IX.

MISCELLANEOUS

- Amendments. This Agreement maybe amended upon written approval of an Amendment or Addendum by all Members. The approval by a Member of an Amendment or Addendum to this Agreement shall not be effective until a certified copy of the resolution of the legislative body of the Member is filed with the Secretary of the Authority, together with a fully executed original of such Amendment.
- 9.2 <u>Notice</u>. Any notice required to be given or delivered hereunder shall be delivered via the United States Postal Service.
- 9.3 Choice of Law. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California.
- 9.4 <u>Severability</u>. If one or more clauses, sentences, paragraphs or provisions of this Agreement shall be held to be unlawful, invalid or unenforceable, it is hereby agreed by the Members that the remainder of the Agreement shall not be affected thereby.

- 9.5 <u>Initial Notice</u>. Within thirty (30) days of the Effective Date of this Agreement, the Authority shall cause a notice of the Agreement to be prepared in the manner set forth in Section 6503.5 of the Government Code and filed with the Office of the Secretary of State.
- 9.6 <u>Additional Notices</u>. Within thirty (30) days of the Effective Date of any Amendment or Addendum to this Agreement, the Authority shall prepare and file with the Office of the Secretary of State the notice required by Section 6503.5 of the Government Code.
